

# Wants County Divided Into Three Areas for Planning

Division of the county into three planning areas, was proposed by the subjects to be discussed by the Planning Association Tuesday, when Robert Sereno, president of the Planning Association, reported for the Halton Planning Association.

Mr. Sereno proposed that the county be divided into three planning areas, one for the area around Oakville and Burlington, one for the area around Mississauga and Brampton, and one for the area around Georgetown and Brantford.

In making the proposal, he noted that there was presently no overall planning concept in the county. "Halton is an ideal place for the people but it does require a united front," he suggested.

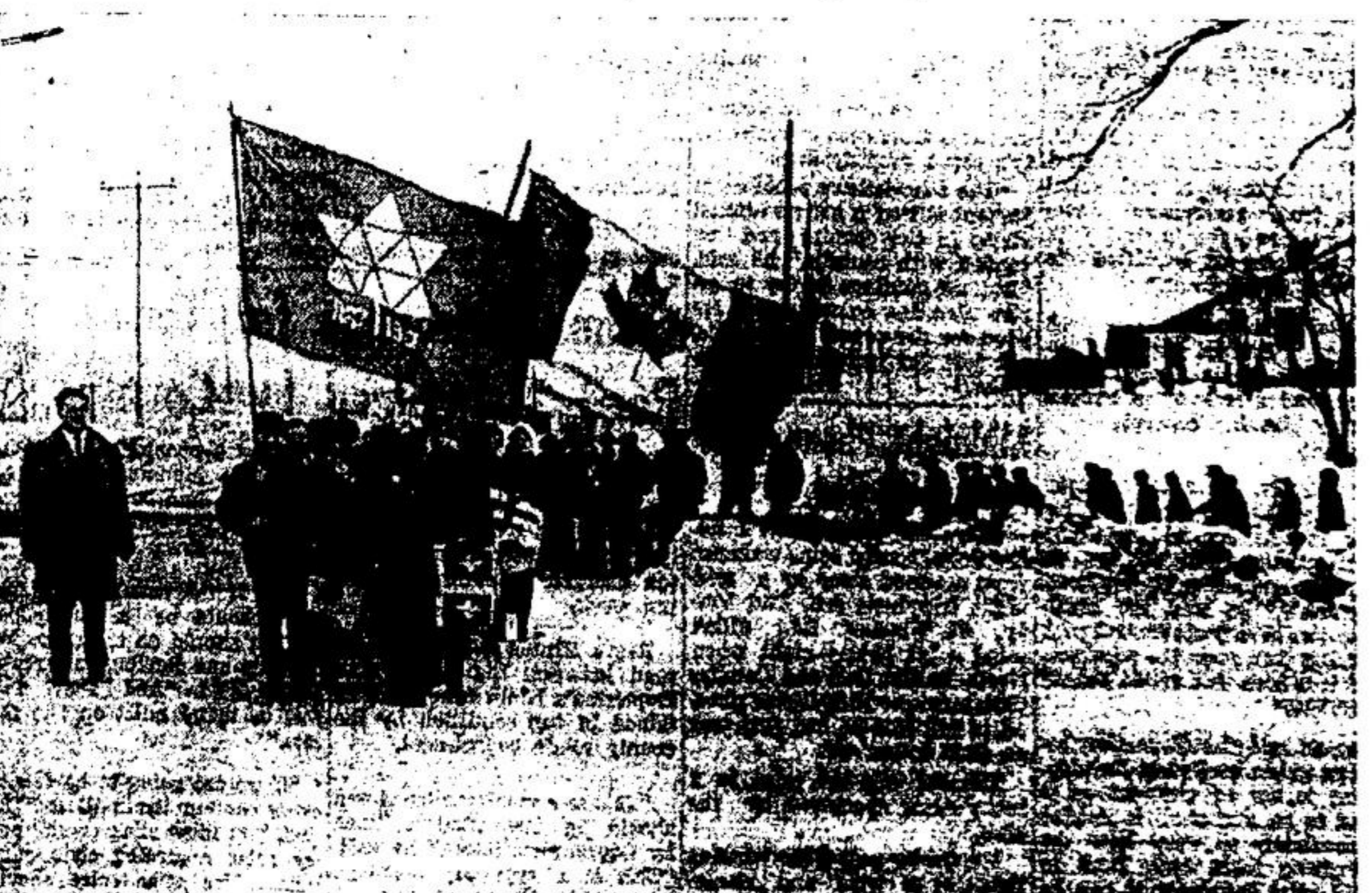
## This Was Centennial Year - Tree Burning ...

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...dging competition in October. Reeve G. Leslie, as chairman of the county agricultural committee made the presentation of pen and pencil sets. It was noted a team from the Acton 4H Club placed second.

#### Warden Reports Busy Week

Warden Coulter reported he had attended 362 meetings and uncounted social functions representing the county during his term as warden.

He expressed disappointment the county had not adopted the county assessment commissioner system and suggested equalization would be very difficult next year. In the planned county welfare system all had opted out but Acton and Nassagaweya which created a ridiculous operation he would seek to eliminate next year.

#### Old and New Meet

Members of council paid tribute to retiring members Herb Merry, George Leslie, Frank Rogers and Charles Menefy. Reeve A. Ledwith presented some coloured pictures of county centennial activities to the retiring warden.

Members elect to the County Council, T. Hill, Mrs. E. Burke, Bill Gillies and Ron Harris were welcomed to the meeting.

#### Meet Minister on Merger

Council agreed with Peel County in authorizing representation to the Minister of Health to discuss the proposed merger of the Halton and Peel Boards of Health. Warden Coulter said such an amalgamation now without provincial decisions on the Flunkett and Smith Reports would be foolish.

#### Merge Committees

The county's two Consultative Committees on Education, one for the elementary schools and one for the secondary schools will be merged to form a combined committee, members of Halton County Council agreed on Tuesday.

Chairman E. Gudgeon, made the suggestion in reporting for the Consultative Committee that in April recommended a county board of education. Mr. Gudgeon emphasized that there would be more work ahead in implementing the provincial policy of a board of education for Halton.

#### Amend Road By-Law

Amendments to the county road system were authorized by-law adding approximately 3 miles to the county system and removing about one third of a mile. The additions were in Burlington and Nassagaweya and the deletion was in Burlington.

#### Expect Film in May

Joe Hurst, chairman of the County Industrial Committee, reported on the progress being made in preparation of a film on Halton. Weather delays had been overcome and the filming was now complete, he told the members of council. A screening in May was anticipated.

#### Two Honour Winners

During the meeting the County honoured Carl Middlebrook and Murray Brownridge who placed first against 82 teams in the Ontario 4H Inter-Club Ju-

## 1967 Was Year of Change For Halton County Farmers

Our Centennial Year certainly cannot be classed as a normal year for agriculture.

Rainfall was considerably above normal in June, resulting in delayed haying and slow germination and growth of the spring grains and corn. The hay yield was considerably above average, but quality was quite poor because of the rain. As a result, cows are turning up their noses at the forage this winter and not producing as much milk from it.

With poorer drainage on our heavy clay soils, oats, barley, and corn yields were slightly below normal. However, on the lighter soils in the north and west of Halton, yields were considerably above average, with grain corn yielding up to 130 bushels per acre, on some farms. Corn silage had a high percentage of well-matured kernels which will add considerable energy for the dairy and beef cattle.

Beautiful sunny weather prevailed during the first three weeks in September, permitting farmers to catch up with the harvesting and summer backlog of work. Then rains came again and grain corn harvesting continued until just recently.

1967 was a year of great changes in dairying, with the allocation of quotas and the improved standards in quality requirements. Almost 100 dairymen in Halton have sold their farms or quit producing milk. Average milk production continues to improve each year.

Halton has built up a reputation for quality cattle. Many awards have been won at Fairs, not only in Halton, but throughout Canada and the United States. A highlight was the sale of the Holstein bull calf by Claude Pickett for a world record price of \$150,000.

1967 was a year of decline in egg and hog prices, and price improvement for beef.

Our 4H's and Junior Farmers had a record year, winning the Provincial 4H Inter-Club Field Crop competition, the Queen's Guinea competition, and the Judging Competition, at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair.

Agriculture is changing rapidly in Halton. To meet these changes farmers are attending increasing numbers of meetings on farm management and other specific topics. The successful farmer of the future must be as up-to-date as the accountant, lawyer, or tax collector — in fact, he should be more so.
