

4-Goal Deficit Doesn't Faze Raiders, Win 8-5

With less than five minutes left in the second period of an OHA Suburban Junior C League game in Ajax, Tuesday, Dec. 20 Georgetown Raiders trailed Ajax 5-1 apparently on their way to a deserved drubbing in the home arena of the loop's fourth place club.

At the final buzzer a dejected and bewildered group of Ajax players slowly filed toward their dressing room mumbling something about blowing hockey games and how did they do it.

Raiders, the league's late sleepers, woke up in time to jump home seven unanswered goals and fashion an 8-5 victory out of certain defeat.

Though John Quackenbush, Bill Dwyer and Paul Robinson each scored twice, the leaders in this one weren't among the team sleepers.

Brian Peavey in goal and recent addition Bob Larman at the blueline were the outstanding Raiders and kept their club from falling even farther behind in the contest's first and second periods.

Strongly, Raiders drew first blood. Robinson and Phil Lawell had Ajax looking at a one goal deficit before the game was a minute old.

John Horton evened things at 11:14 and Don Piotrowski pushed Ajax into the lead near the end of the first period.

Don Horton struck at 2:25 of the middle period, and Bill Morrison found the range at 8:22 and 12:21 to open a 5-1 gap on their frustrated visitors.

Bill Dwyer from Terry Leswick and Paul Robinson at 11:55, and Robinson again from Dwyer and Ron Lane at 19:56 made it respectable at the end of the second frame.

The Ontario Department of Education's new winter holidays setup is presenting problems for the International Bantam Hockey Tournament committee, but nothing that can't be ironed out according to Kinsmen Fred Harrison.
