**Babies Find Homes in Time for Christmas**

The Halton County Children's Aid was able to give the nine babies received from its London sister society permanent homes for Christmas, Mrs. E.L. Mander, head of the adoptions department said.

The babies range in age from a few weeks to six months.

The Halton County agency took the babies when the Western society was faced with an emergency. In London they had children still in maternity wards waiting to be placed. Dr. Gordon Askwith, Halton County Children's Aid director decided to "cut the red tape and treat them like Halton County babies."

**Children's Aid**

In the past the local Children's Aid has co-operated with those in Toronto and Hamilton by sending prospective parents to them.

"These babies are the first that have been sent in a batch from another society," said Dr. Askwith.

Mrs. Mander said the Halton County agency is "prepared to do this again and is looking into how it can be done."

The Halton County Society has one of the best adoption records in the country. There were 40 couples with applications in for adoption. Nine of these have been processed and will become new parents in the next few days.

**Foster Homes**

As well there is a large number of foster homes on standby where children can be placed for six to eight weeks.

Following the program Santa Claus arrived and all the children and Sunday School teachers were presented with a gift and oranges. Lunch was served in the basement and a social hour enjoyed. Due to sickness several members were unable to attend.
