Conservation Areas are Show Place for CUCA Activities

Originally the Credit River survey, submitted by the Ontario Government, suggested a series of dams along the river for water storage and to prevent disastrous floods. It is the aim of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority to implement these plans as funds become available.

Now that the first dam is underway, thoughts turn to the next set of problems to be faced. The flood control projects are of major importance and will take the greater portion of the budget for some time to come.

The showcases of the Authority are its multiple-use conservation areas, used not only for recreation but to make the public aware of the various phases of conservation as it pertains to the individual. These areas are located at Terra Cotta, Belfountain and the new Monora Conservation Area just north of Orangeville on Hwy. 10. This last named is a joint project of the town of Orangeville, Township of Mono and the CVCA. Last year the Authority acquired almost 200 acres at Limehouse, west of Georgetown and this will be developed in the future.

Although not strictly a recreation area, the CVCA Farm at Hillsburgh will show the general public both modern farming methods and farming as it was done before the turn of the century.

The Meadowvale Conservation Area, 118 acres winding along the river at Meadowvale will also be developed in the future. Much of the northern part of this property is a natural wildlife area and will be kept as such. The colonial house on the property built originally in 1830, has been preserved on the outside. The inside has been rebuilt to form offices for Chairman McMillan, Secretary-Treasurer, G. W. Bentley, Superintendent N.J. McMahon and Field Officer, S. B. White. These offices replaced the original headquarters at Terra Cotta.

The CVCA owns over 2,000 acres of land in the watershed, much of it covered with trees. Much of the marginal land in the valley is of no use for anything else and the Authority conducts an annual tree-planting program. The aim of the program is to help the private landowner plant marginal acres thus preventing erosion and quick run-off in the spring.

All these aims of the Authority all the work that has gone into getting as far as the CVCA has over the past 12 years has gone for nothing if the future members of municipal, provincial and federal governments, (the school children of today) do not learn a healthy respect for their green areas. These young people are interested and the Credit Valley Conservation Authority intends to promote this interest so that future legislation will not undo all the accomplishments completed this far.

Here Only Two Weeks Two Western Elk Dead

After only two weeks in Ontario, two of the five Elk brought from Alberta to the Halton Conservation Authority game preserve near Rattlesnake Point have died. The first was found dead Saturday and the second on Sunday of last week.

Dave Murray, H.R.C.A. field officer, said one of the Elk had suffered a broken neck. It is suspected the animal had been running from someone (probably children) and was likely looking backwards when it crashed into a tree.

Mr. Murray explained many children are climbing the eight foot fence and chasing the Elk about the grounds, which encompasses some 70 acres of land.

"This is very dangerous and unless people are kept out, some one is sure to get killed."

A watchman has been engaged to keep visitors outside the fence. Apparently the Elk are easily "spooked" or frightened and children chasing the Elk cause them to suffer from hypertension. The remaining three have been vaccinated and it is hoped the two dead Elk might be replaced without going to Alberta.

Frank Timmermans, H.C.R.A. wild life technician, and Maurice Readhead, a former works superintendent for the Authority who retired last year flew West and brought the Elk back by train Saturday, December 2, to join the five buffalo already in the reserve.
