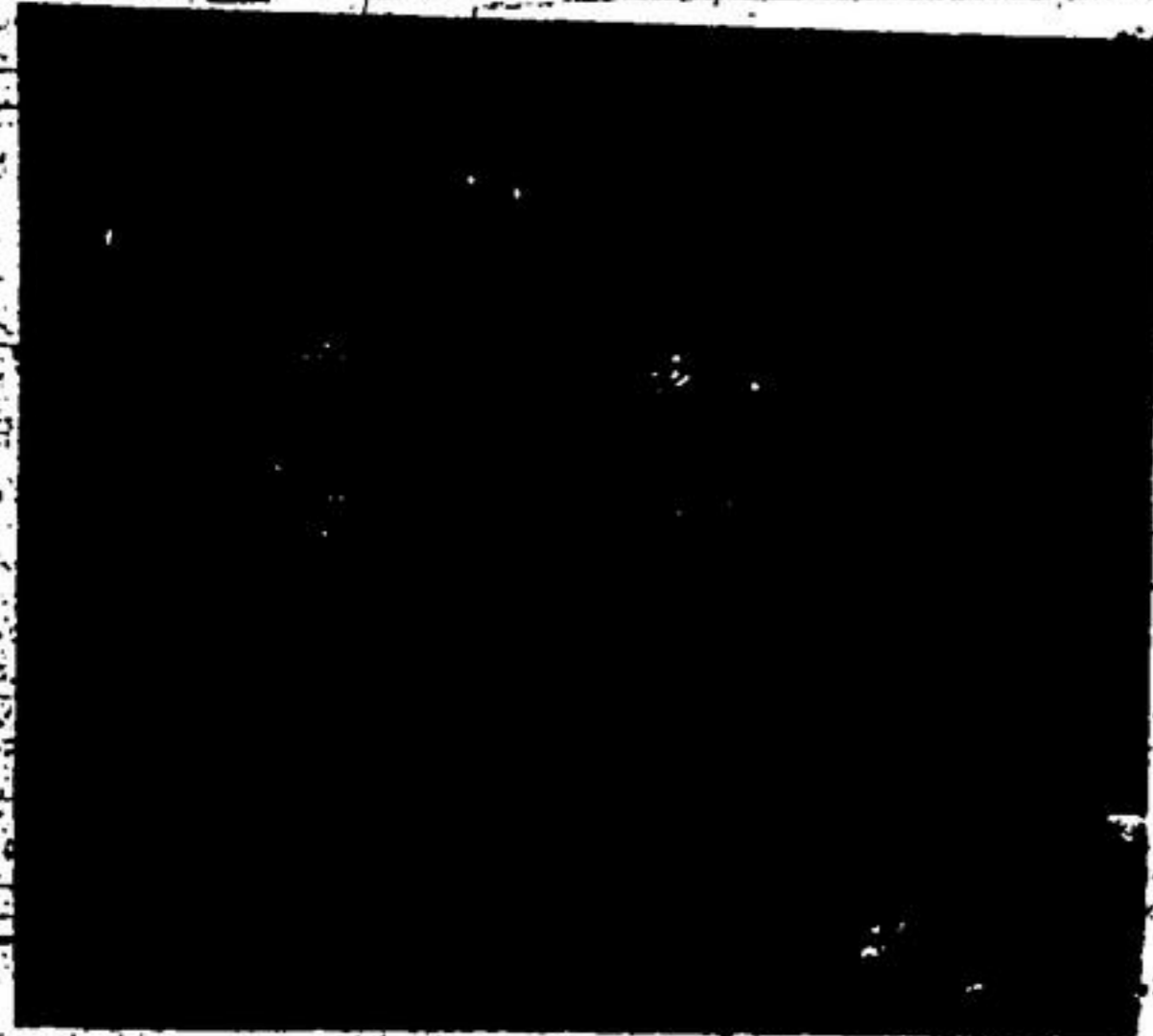


## Gehl District Manager At National Sales Meet

Luke A. Cazabon, 36 Moultriey Cres., Georgetown, returned this week from West Bend, Wis., where he attended Gehl Company's national sales meeting. Cazabon is district sales manager for Gehl farm machinery in this area.

While at the conference, Cazabon received intensive training on new Gehl products introduced this year, including a new Hay King mower-conditioner and a silo-based high capacity recycler. Both items will be sold through franchised dealers in this area, according to the district sales manager.

The meeting was attended by Gehl sales representatives from throughout the U.S. and Canada. Purpose of the seminar, according to Cazabon, was to provide new and updated information on the company's expanding and specialized line of farm machinery.

## Control Air Traffic to Lessen Accident Danger

It is hard to imagine having too many aircraft in the skies, but the Federal Dept. of Transport is not taking any chances. The Dept. is initiating an air traffic control service to reduce the likelihood of collisions over or around major airports.

The service, which will eventually be spread throughout the country, will be initiated in an area centred about Toronto Airport. The service is aimed at light or private flying aircraft.

At present many of the aircraft are flying visual rules (VFR) that is, the aircraft can be seen or air traffic control radar but communication is not possible.

The ultimate purpose of the program is to integrate visual flying rules with instrument flying rules (IFR). Aircraft receive directions from the controller on the ground by IFR.

Burlington, Skyway, Mohawk, Raceway, Aetna, Orangeville, Aurora, Markham and Fairport Beach have been cited as these graphical fixes. Each of these sites will have controllers who act as policemen for the skies and advise aircraft if they are about to overtake a second aircraft or if they are near another plane.

The system is being initiated at Toronto because of the increased number of near misses that have occurred recently. A near miss is hard to define, as some pilots report near misses as anything closer than 1,000 feet and others do not.

Aircraft movements out of Toronto airport have increased from 10,000 a month in 1965 to 20,000 a month this year and there are about 2,000 light aircraft in the area from St. Catharines and Brantford to Oshawa.

As of this week all VFR aircraft flying within a 20 mile radius of Toronto airport must contact the Toronto airport, March 1, this will be extended to a 30-mile area.

Special corridors have been allotted flying clubs near the airport at Brampton, Maple and King City. They will not have to contact the Toronto terminal.

- A fire of unknown origin early Monday morning completely destroyed Credit Valley Boat Works at Norval. A neighbour discovered the blaze at 1.30 a.m. and woke owner Ray Pomeroy. Heat scorched buildings on both sides of the boat works and two piles of lumber at the rear. Included in the loss was a boat under construction.

## Final Esqueusing Meeting Is Also Revision Court

Final meeting for Esqueusing Council was held on Wednesday, Dec. 19th and members also met as a Court of Revision to clear up the year's business.

Claims for sheep killed or injured by dogs in the township were paid to W. L. McDonald \$10 and A. N. Stark \$5 for a trip. W. L. McDonald was also paid \$5 for destroying a dog. Bob Pelletier and Jim Forbes will each receive \$7 for destroying foxes.

Council instructed the clerk to write the Credit Valley Conservation Authority stating Esqueusing was not satisfied with the individual quotations on the channel improvement at Glen Williams and would like a meeting with Conservation authorities at the earliest possible date to discuss them.

T. H. Van Stikler was appointed to the Georgetown district high school board for 1968 and 1969.

James McPhail and Denney Charles, both of R.R. 2, Georgetown, were appointed to the Committee of Adjustment for a two year term.

Paul Armstrong, Georgetown, and James Sprout, Milton, were appointed to the Board of the Sunshine School for 1968 and 1969.

Council passed a resolution that the corporation take no proceedings against Messrs. Joseph Kremer or Norman Johnson in respect of a conveyance of land Lot 30, Concession 9, dated October 24th, 1967, and registered November 8th, 1967, respectively as Instruments Numbers 236180 and 236181, where conveyances were registered of less than 570 feet each, following approval thereof by the Committee of Adjustment of the Township of Esqueusing in pursuance of its power to approve minor variances, and that said conveyance not be deemed invalid pursuant to By-Law No. 28-56.

Council adjourned to meet as a Court of Revision with Reeve Leslie in the chair and passed a resolution authorizing a vote on taxes amounting to \$452.70. Taxes amounting to \$150.94 were written off.

Adjourning as a Court of Revision and meeting as a Council members passed a resolution that all full time township employees be given a turkey as a gift in appreciation of their services.

With retiring reeve George Leslie vacating the chair and his successor reeve-elect George Currie holding the gavel, the Council passed a final resolution that their thanks be extended to Reeve George Leslie for the courteous and impartial manner in which he presided over the meetings during the past year.
