51 Join Branch 120 As Members in 1967

The branch New Year's party was without a doubt one of the more successful undertakings of 1967. It could be called "the wind-up of a very good year."

Looking back into 1967, we see several outstanding happenings. The big one being the Legion Veterans week, which no one can deny did so much to bring the true image of Legion and what it means to the citizens of Canada.

Branch 120 on this occasion was outstanding in its endeavor for there was not a Branch in the District could have surpassed 120 in success.

Membership was excellent last year. Chairman Buster Hale set himself a "hard to obtain target" when he declared he hoped to increase the membership by fifty new members. He was successful for when the count was taken of applications accepted at the end of the year there were fifty-one new members for 1967.

District B had an increase of 2,000 at the beginning of the year. The total membership was 15,000 it now stands at 17,000.

Throughout Ontario Command the powers that be had hoped to reach 100,000 members. The target was not reached. 98,000 is the membership of the command, however an increase of 8% is looked for in 1968.

However there is a question that no-one seems to have an answer to; why do a number of members fail to renew their membership each year?

This is a problem that starts at Dominion Command and persists right down to Branch-level. At 120 last year thirty members failed to renew their membership and the big question seems to be WHY?

It is thought by some that perhaps a person, or committee should be appointed to delve into this situation and may come up with an answer. The reasons could be many and varied, but what ever they are there must be a solution.

Cadet Corps No Longer Restricted to High School

It is no longer necessary for a youth to be enrolled in high school to be a member of the Georgetown Cadet Corps.

Lorne Scots captain Frank Ching, Georgetown-based Company's commanding officer, told the Herald that the cadet corps is open to any youth age 13 to 19.

"Even Grade Eighters are welcome to join," Captain Ching said.

The Corps, which was dropped by the high school after several years of sponsorship last spring, has been taken under the wing of the Lorne Scots Regiment.

Some 75 members are meeting in the Georgetown Armoury on Park Street every Tuesday and are learning general military knowledge through lectures pending formal transfer of sponsorship. These deal with weapons, drill, map reading and tactics.

When formal transfer is completed, Lorne Scots will introduce a new program.

The Contennial fund target was obtained by all Branches of Zone B7. But District B is still looking for another 25% to make it a fully paid district.

At Branch 120 another milestone for 1967 was the September Stag Dinner which did much to swell the Branch coffers.

The entertainment Committee hope to have another stag early in March.

This year will be an interesting one, during which there may be a number of big decisions for the membership to make.

One which must be answered right away, will the price of the commodity sold at the Branch be raised?
