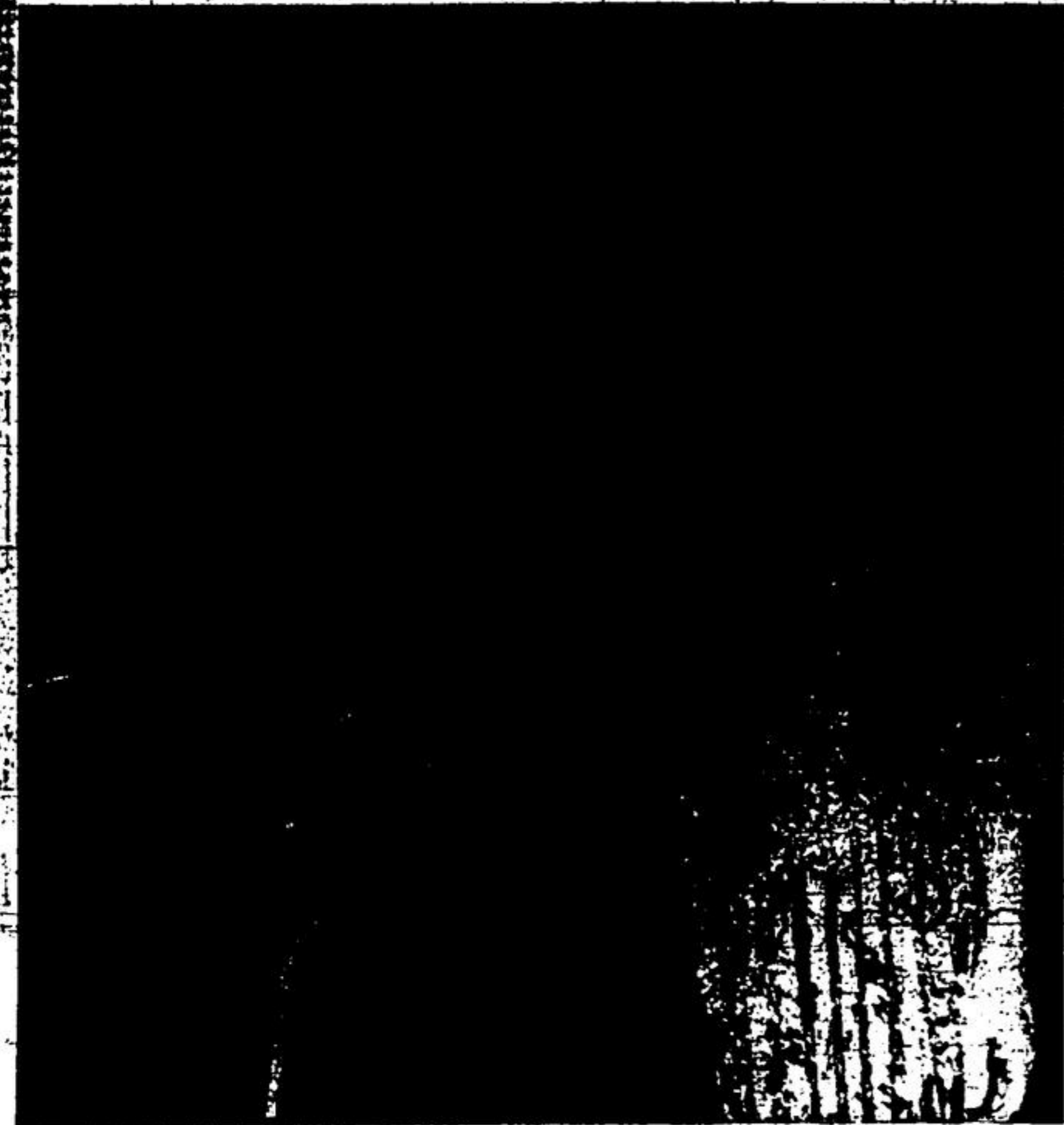

IN THE MAIL BAG

Object to Fines for Petty Speed Infringements

Dear Sir: Some years ago it was quite common to hear people complain about the methods adopted by some small town police forces in the USA, in the enforcement of traffic laws. Many an unwary Canadian had the misfortune to lose a "packet full of dollars" by running into some unrealistic speed zone. The State of Georgia was notorious in this respect. Nowadays, I am very much afraid we have the same thing happening right here in 'Georgiana-town'.

I am well aware that we have an efficient police force and that their job is to enforce the law, but in this imperfect world we can never hope to achieve such perfection that our statutes will be without flaws. There fore it is incumbent upon the police to use ordinary God-given common sense when carrying out their duties.

I, for one, don't think the local police have any solid reason for handing out tickets at seven thirty in the morning for minor traffic infractions. As far as the little blue radar wagon is concerned I feel that most of our citizens are far from enthused about its over-activity along Summer Seven Highway between here and Norval. As one of the many residents who has to drive out of town to earn a livelihood I feel that the local police consider us "Fair Game" in the morning and if they miss us, then sure they will have another go at us when we return in the evening. In between time we have to run the gauntlet of the Chingonassay and the Toronto Pwp. police who believe Huttonville to be their earthly paradise as far as traffic tickets are concerned. I do not mention the OPP and Metro Toronto Police because they are too busy doing their job of keeping the traffic moving in a safe and efficient manner to be bothered with such petty infringements.

From the figures published in your paper, Georgetown surely leads the whole North American continent in parking tickets here too, I feel, a little more discretion could be used.

Fears Highway "Gasoline Alley" Highway 7 could become gasoline alley, stated Reeve W.
