Prisoners Back in Cells After Boiler Repaired

Prisoners who were transferred to other jails when the oil-fired boiler in the Halton County Jail broke down last week were brought back to Milton on Saturday — after the boiler was repaired.

Nine of the prisoners were taken to the Barton Street Jail in Hamilton. Halton County Warden William Coulter said that two others were transferred to Ontario Reformatory in Guelph.

These two were waiting for transportation there, anyhow, he added.

Another prisoner was sent to penitentiary in Kingston.

Georgetown Police Department's van was used in the 11-hour trip.

Just before the turn of the year, the century-old jail was criticized for the lack of facilities provided for the prisoners there. A special criticism was the lack of an adequate library in the building.

Halton will soon get a new detention centre — the ultra-modern Maplehurst Regional Detention Centre, planned for north of Hwy. 401, near Hornby. At this new centre, the emphasis will be on rehabilitation of the prisoners, rather than on punishment.

Limehouse Church Elects Two Elders

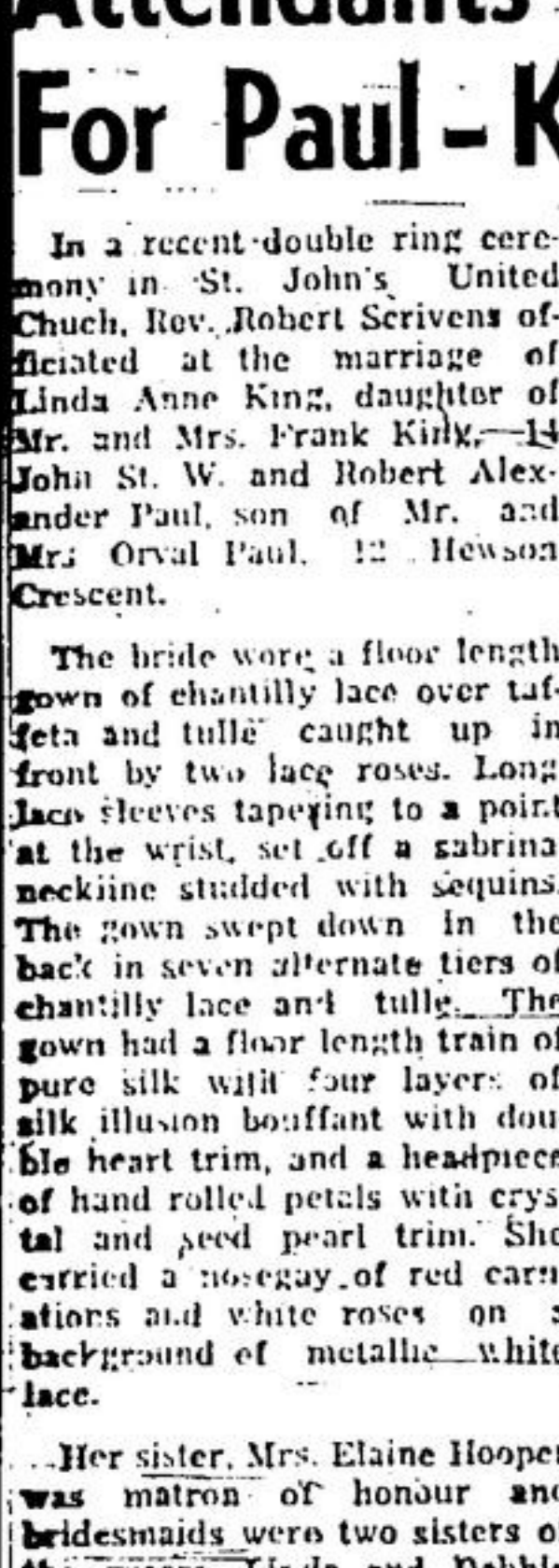
