## Trailing 4, Raiders End Game as Winners

The Georgetown Raiders showed why they're leading the Suburban Junior C Hockey League Friday night.

The Raiders fell behind 4-0 to the Oakville Blades and then rallied for six straight goals in the last two periods for a stunning 6-4 victory.

Paul Robinson, the league's leading scorer, had two of the Georgetown goals, along with defenceman Phil Lavell. Other Raider markers went to Terry Hay and Terry Leswick.

Mike Kilpatrick, Charlie Burton, Henry Hunting and Randy LaVoy netched the Blade goals.

The Blades looked as if they were ready to skate the Raiders right out of the rink as they scored in a comfortable 3-0 lead in the first period.

Two of the Oakville goals were of the soft variety as Kilpatrick scored from a bad angle near the faceoff circle and Burton stole a loose puck and slid it under Raider goalie Brian Peavoy.

Georgetown coach Gerry Inalls lifted Peavoy after the first period and inserted Bob Cowbrough in the nets.

After giving up the fourth goal, a long screened shot by LaVoy, Cowbrough blanked the

Blades they rest of the way while his team-mates gradually took command of the game.

Blade goalie Ted Lensen, up from the Midget ranks to fill in for regular Gerry Gobel, still sailing, let a loose puck get away from him and Lavell, poked it in to start Georgetown on the comeback trail.

Robinson and Hay tallied for the Raiders before the second period ended, reducing a once healthy 4-0 Blade lead to 4-3.

The Raiders wasted little time tying the game in the third period as Robinson raced down the left wing and ripped a vicious slapshot past Lensen after just 50 seconds of play.

Lavell sank the Blades with a long shot from the point minutes later, with the goal that turned out to be the winner.

The Blades had trouble moving the puck out of their own end as the Raiders turned to checking and it paid off with the clinching goal by Leswick midway through the period.

The game was a tape one compared to the usual Oakville-Georgetown battles.

Just five minor penalties, all against the Raiders, were called during the game.
