Speed Infractions Raise Most of Month's Fines

A total of \$1,825 in fines was levied by Georgetown police under the Highway Traffic Act during December, most of it, about 75 per cent, the result of speed limit infractions.

Charges laid under the Highway Traffic Act totalled 228. The total amount of fines imposed during the month was \$2,519. Criminal Code charges accounted for \$450, Liquor Control Act for \$150, and By-Law infractions \$84.

The figures were disclosed in a monthly report released to The Herald this week. Nineteen juveniles and nine adults were charged under the Criminal Code of Canada, and 10 charges were laid under the Liquor Control Act.

There were also 487 tags issued for parking violations. Thirteen major and 12 minor motor accidents resulted in four injuries, and 2,346 man hours were utilized investigating 162 complaints.

Thefts over \$50 totalled three, under \$50, 15, and value of the stolen property was estimated at \$253. Sixty dollars in stolen property was recovered before the end of the month.

Fourteen people were arrested, and 74 summonses served. One child was reported missing and located.

The department's two cruisers and traffic van travelled 12,909 miles during the report period.

Possible Whiplash In Motor Accident

Dave Armstrong, 10 Lorne St., suffered a possible whiplash in a rear end motor accident Thursday morning on Guelph St. He was driving east on the street when collided with from behind by a car driven by Rudolf Biscaglia of Brampton.

Georgetown police said damage was \$100 to each car. Later the same day cars operated by Harold G. Lyons of RR 2, Norval and Donald Gosling of 19 Norton Crescent collided at the corner of Water and Back St. Police said damage in this one totalled \$250.

There were two motor mishaps Friday. A car operated by Bernice Tomkinson, 67 Charles St., and a Georgetown Dairy milk van driven by George A. Mumby collided in a Charles St. driveway resulting in \$150 damage. And, at the same driveway, about an hour and a half later a car driven by Robert Tomkinson, 67 Charles St., and a truck driven by Robert Harry Hamilton, 18 Riverview Crescent, came together doing \$750 damage.
