## Licence Plate Sales Behind, Urge Action

Some alarming statistics have just been released from the Department of Transport, showing that the sale of new 1968 plates is lagging alarmingly with almost 2,000,000 motorists in the province still without the new blue-and-white plates.

When contacted by the Herald, local issuer Mrs. B. L. Clark, said the situation was about the same in Georgetown, with the percentage under 20 per cent sold, average with the rest of the province.

"However, if Georgetown residents run true to form, I don't anticipate any real problems," Mrs. Clark said. "In the last few years Georgetown people have cooperated 100 per cent, and I'm quite sure will again this year. I expect this Friday and Saturday will be quite busy and expect it to continue."

Sales at the local office reached 20 per cent yesterday, leaving an estimated several thousand car owners to still register, with some thousand odd truckers to come after the cars are registered.

The office is situated at 41 Main St. South and is open on Saturdays until 1 p.m.

## Carpenter Helped Build Field Hospitals in War

A man who first came to Canada from England in 1905, George Bert Harrison, 85, died in Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton on January 8th.

Mr. Harrison was a native of Tidington-on-Thames. He lived at Eldorado and Brampton after emigrating, and returned to England during World War I, where he was employed in field hospital construction with the British army during the war.

Returning to Brampton after the war, he had his own carpentry business until 1945, then was employed at Orenda Engines, Malton until he retired fifteen years ago.

Mr. Harrison was the father of Fred (Tut) Harrison, a former Georgetown councillor, who is now purchasing agent for the town. He also leaves another son Bert of Brampton, daughters Mrs. Barkley-Harris, Orangeville and Mrs. Ed Furness, Brampton; 18 grandchildren and 24 great-grandchildren. He was predeceased by his wife, Sarah Elizabeth Davies in 1930, and by a daughter Flosie.

Interment in Brampton cemetery followed the funeral service at the McKillop Funeral Home.
