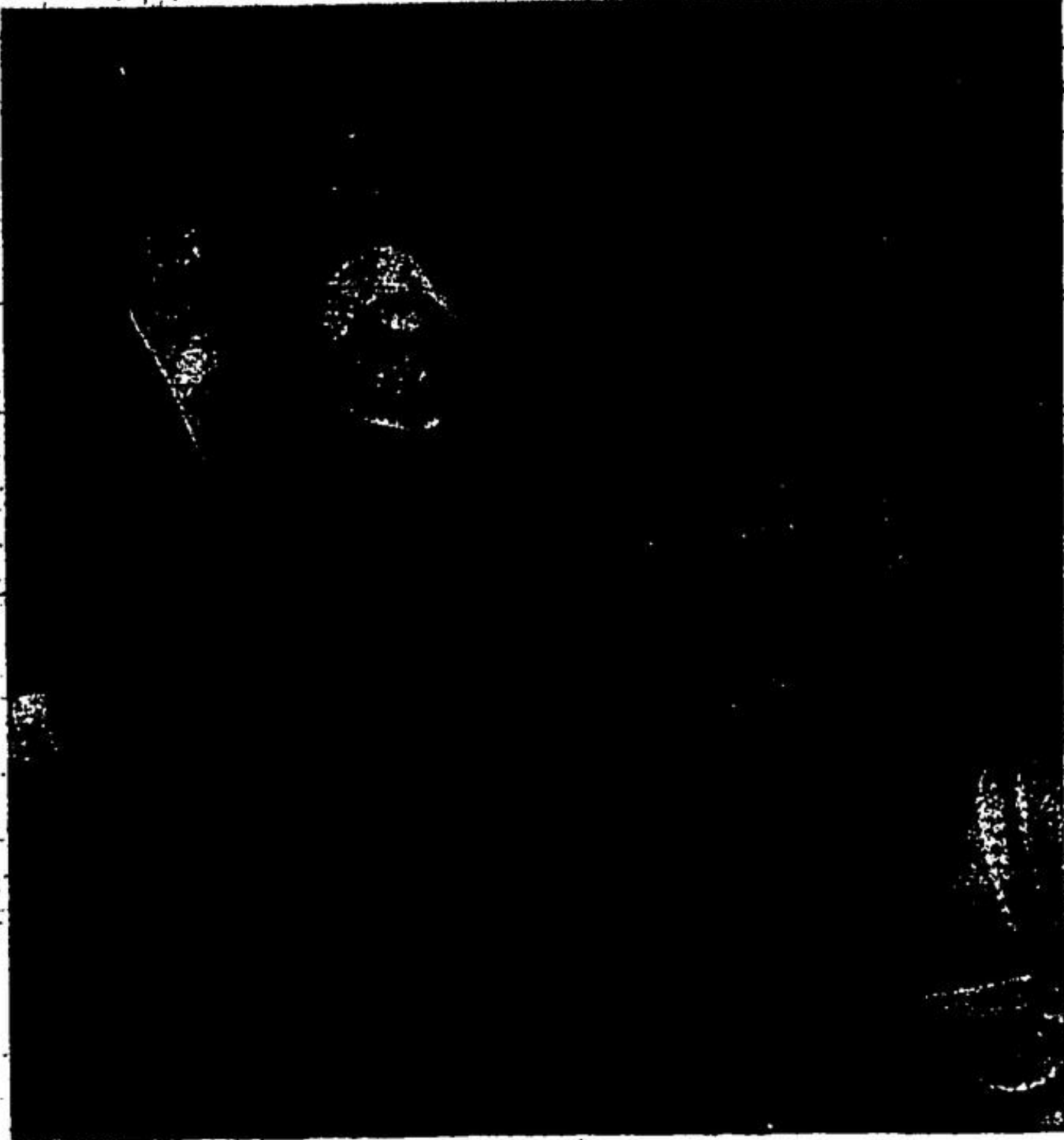


MacKinnon Rink Wins Bospiel . . .

Trophy Winner Oakville Women's Rink Curling

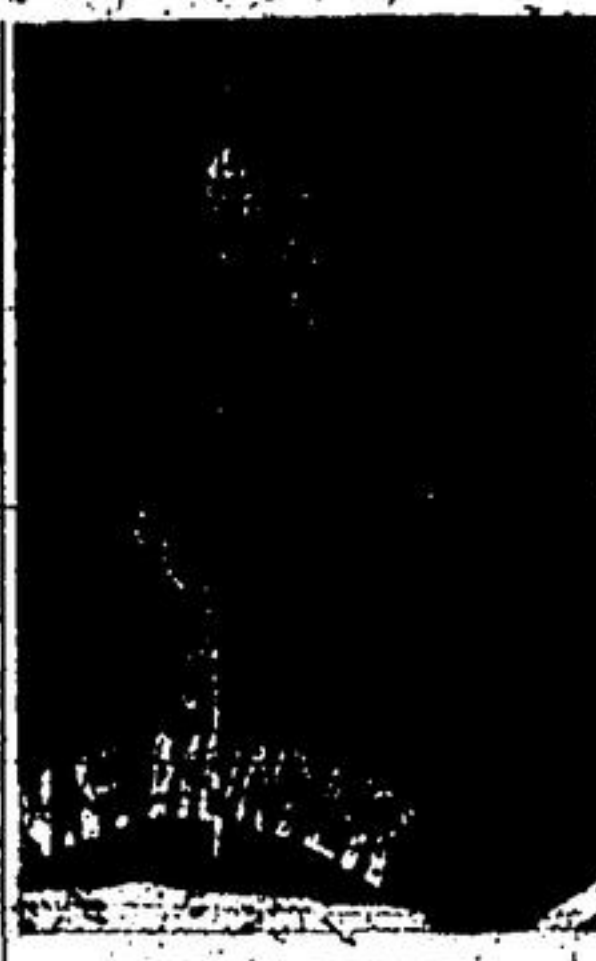
An Oakville rink of which a former Georgetown curler was a member, won the Curling Trophy in a bospiel at North Halton Curling Club Wednesday January 24.
