Baffled for a Period Wings Soar to Victory

It took Hamilton Red Wings almost a full period to puzzle out the close checking of Georgetown Junior C Raiders and the limiting confines of the Memorial Arena ice surface. Friday night, when they found the code Eddie Bush's crew put together an 8-1 win.

Red Wings engaged Raiders in an exhibition joust in front of a capacity crowd for the benefit of local minor hockey and made it clear early they were not stepping out of their regular schedule for the benefit of Georgetown Raiders.

Brent McMullen left the game late in the second period on a stretcher, and Bill Dwyer was knocked into never-never land in the third frame when they both committed the cardinal sins of turning their backs on a couple of the Wings' head collectors.

Lee Carpenter and Fred Speck exhibited abilities with the quicker-than-the-eye elbow, and behind-the-ref scull cracking that should make them shoe-ins for NHL berths where owners look on such talents as job qualifications.

Hamilton solved the Raiders' checking at 17:27 of the initial period when Rich Pettit got behind the defense to score, and for those who missed it he worked a replay 20 seconds later.

Red Wings inflated their margin 5-1 in the second period on goals by Jim Adair and Gary Coalter around the two minute mark, and Coalter, again mid-way-through-the-period.

Raiders lone marker was a clean one at 13:10 by Paul Robinson from Bill Dwyer and Brent McMullen.

Speck, Leclerc, and Adair piled the goals up in the last session.

Hamilton split their netminding between Gerry Gray and Jim Rutherford, and Raiders plugged their goal with Fred Cowbrough and Brian Peavoy.

Georgetown minor hockey referees handled the officiating. Hamilton outshot the Raiders 25 to 21.
