Adjudicator Gives Praise "Very Good Production"

So said Leslie Yeo, after viewing Georgetown Little Theatre's production of "The Innocents" in the high school auditorium.

Mr. Yeo, noted Canadian actor and director, was here to adjudicate Georgetown's drama festival entry, playing its third night to a well-filled house. Mr. Yeo starred with Kate Reid last summer in "The Circle" at Niagara-on-the-Lake.

He commended the costuming particularly. Gowns were created out of old bedspreads and drapes by a cast member, Lyn Wiggins.

He suggested that the lighting was improper for the play's sombre mood. "There should have been pools of light to highlight scenes, with the rest of the stage in almost-darkness," he said. And while the stage set was first-rate, the walls were too bright for the mood," he commented.

It will be three weeks before results of the adjudication are known, as Mr. Yeo has several more plays to view before he makes his choice for drama festival entries.

"The Innocents" based on a Henry James story "The Turn of the Screw" starred Vera MacDonald in the part played on television some years ago by Ingrid Bergman.

The play is a psychological drama, depending on the actors' skill in convincing the audience of the unnamed horror instilled in two young children, by a wicked servant, now dead. Making their first appearance with the group, Allison Macintosh and Michael Macdonald were excellent while veteran Betty Fisher lent sterling support in her role as the housekeeper, Eric Ming and Lyn Wiggins lent silent support in their "ghostly" roles.

Ron Hill, who has starred in many of the group's productions, directed the play.

Plan Further Improvements At Kelso Recreation Area

Kelso conservation area playground near Milton has become the pet project of the Halton Region Conservator Authority.

Encouraged by the record attendance of 125,000 at Kelso last year — up from 100,000 in 1966, the Authority announced at its annual meeting further steps in a continuing program of improvements.

Architect John Harkness appeared before the Authority Friday with plans for a 'shade shelter' for Kelso, to include a refreshment concession and public washrooms.

That such improvements pay dividends is shown by the success of Kelso's Glen Eden Ski Club this year, which so far has taken in \$12,000 as compared with \$10,000 for all of last season.

The ski area was improved over the summer with re-graded slopes, new snowmaking equipment, enlarged and refurbished chalet and improved lighting for night skiing.

Improvements last year to Kelso's summer facilities included:

Construction began November on work on the Milton Falls and Scotch Block dams, designed to prevent summer drying and spring flooding on the middle and west branches of Sixteen Mile Creek, is expected to begin this spring.

Other projects in the master plan include channel improvements on Fourteen Mile Creek, the Hager-Rambo diversion channel, and development of the Forster flats.

In the Authority's fish and wildlife program, the most significant development was the acquisition of five elk from Fire Island National Park in Alberta, Humphrey said. "The two that have since died will be replaced this year."

Seek Community Leaders' Advice For Libraries

The South-Central Regional Library Board — representing the counties of Wentworth, Brant and Halton — have as one of their projects for 1968 the setting of standards of services that the community should expect from the library, and conversely what the library and community should receive from the provincial body.

KING FARM

Another important development in the wildlife program was the conversion of the King farm in Mountsberg Conservation Area into a game farm, which provided haven for more than 3,000 birds every day. The Authority raised pheasants, quail, chukkers, Canada geese and several variety of ducks.

The Authority also continued its fish-stocking program, with the planting of 4,500 rainbow trout fingerlings in Kelso Reservoir, 80 in Campbellville community pond, and 2,000 largemouth bass in the Mountsberg reservoir.

In its reforestation and land use program, the Authority planted 125,000 trees — up from 85,000 in 1966. Half were planted on Authority land, and the rest on private land at no cost to the owners.
