Church Gave Strong Support To Missions, Primate's Fund.

Besides an allocation of \$3400 for church missions, members of St. George's Anglican Church made a special donation of \$480 to the Primate's World Relief fund last year, members learned at their annual vestry meeting last week. The latter was raised by use of special Lenten envelopes.

The church's \$21,500 budget also included extensive renovations to the rectory which included new carpeting and drapes, painting the exterior and a new porch, and purchase of a number of new hymn and prayer books. This was made possible by a generous donation from the Daughters of the Church and McNally Construction.

The vestry approved an operating budget of \$21,600 for the coming year, which included an increase in salary for the rector and necessary repairs to the organ, as well as \$100 donations to the Canadian Bible Society and the Theological Education fund.

William McNally was elected people's warden and the Rev'd Eric Mills appointed Walter Blehn as rector's warden. He expressed appreciation to Irwin Noble, who retired after serving four years as church warden.

John T. Armstrong and Ted Gorth were elected synod delegates and Mrs. Irwin Noble and Dr. Vicki Zavitz alternates. A new parish council was formed at the suggestion of the rector, composed of the wardens, lay delegates and alternates and Sam Penrice, Jeff Duck and Paul Armstrong. One more member will be appointed by Mr. Mills.

A board of Christian education was established. Members are Jim Costigan, Jeff Duck, William Bingham, Jr., David Meakin and church school superintendents Thomas Perry and Robert Borland. Mrs. Esther Smith and Mrs. Thomas Perry were named as representatives to the Bible Society.

Farmers Win Voice At County Committee Sessions

Over the violent objection of Reeve H. H. Hinton of Acton, a motion to have a representative of the Halton Federation of Agriculture attend all future meetings of the Agricultural Committee of Halton County was passed at County council last week. Only Reeve Hinton opposed.

Reeve Hinton claimed that asking members of organizations to county committee meetings as representatives was beyond the scope of county council members, and has never been done.

Deputy-reeve Oakes of Acton pointed out that the representative would be an advisor, with no vote and no pay.

Reeve W. Coulter of Nassagaweya felt that the Halton Agriculture Representative Henry Stanley had too much to do to attend committee meetings. "Agriculture is one of the most vital industries in the county, and we would be well-advised to have an advisor from the Federation."

"The farmers need all the help they can get," opined Reeve George Currie of Esqueping. "We could do with advice."

James Snow, MPT for Halton East, said this week he has learned that the Department of Health intends to establish a district office for the Air Pollution Control Division of the Ontario Department of Health in Halton within a year.

The district office would be staffed by a district engineer as well as necessary inspectors and other staff and would be responsible for the air pollution control for the Counties of Halton and Peel.

When Dr. Dymond announced last year that the Province was taking over the responsibility for air pollution control, it was stated at that time that implementation of this control system would be initiated over a five year period by which time the whole of the Province of Ontario would be under the surveillance of the Department.

With the establishment of the Halton and Peel District office, this will bring this area under close surveillance in the very early stage of the overall program.
