

Mike Cummins Leading Scorer With Guelph University Team



Michael Cummins, from Georgetown, the University of Guelph's leading hockey scorer continues to improve as the season advances. He scored the Gryphon's only goal in a 3-1 loss to the Marlinns from McMaster University on Saturday.

The 5'11", 165 lb. right winger who lives at 18 Morris Street, Georgetown, is now in his second and final year of Guelph's agricultural diploma course. As well as his ability to score, Mike is a fine skater and aggressive checker.

Mike was Most Valuable Player as a Midget in Georgetown and then went on to play Junior 'C' for the Georgetown Raiders and Junior 'B' for the Burlington Mohawks. Cummins got his latest goal in the first period as his slap shot from about ten feet out was blocked by the Marlinns goalie, but then trickled over the goal line.

Mike is very popular with the Guelph fans, who are desperately looking for something to cheer about. The Gryphons have a very frustrating season as they have looked good at times but have been able to win only one league game. Guelph plays at home Saturday hosting McGill.

Milton wrestled the lead away at 8:15 of the middle period when Brush scored from Kevin Ifall, but it was the last time they owned an advantage. McMennemy from Lane made a new game of it at 9:17 and Lane from Kent Robinson and John Quackenbush shifted the lead to the Raider camp seconds later.
