

Dominion Party Majority In High School Elections

In last week's high school elections, the Dominion Party, led by Tony McAuley defeated the National Party, headed by Mark Irwin, gaining sixty per cent of the vote.

Since Georgetown may send ten delegates to the Model Parliament on Port Credit March 20, 21 and 22 the Dominion Party will send six and the National Party, four.

The delegates from the Dominion party will be Tony McAuley, Alex Goudekelling, Bob Barber, David Warren, Tom McCormick, John Riley and from the National Party Mark Irwin, Doug Stephens, Simon Perrott and Claude Champagne.

A seventy per cent turnout of voters reflected the vigorous campaign conducted by both parties, with every history class visited and the issues debated.

The Dominion party wound up with a bang-up election rally, with a rock band, and records punctuated by election slogans.

Leslie Owen organized the elections, acquiring ballot boxes, and finding poll clerks and scrutineers.

Both parties took a stand on reformation of abolition of the Senate, the problem of Indian affairs, and educational matters.
