

## \$1300 Damage In Accidents In Georgetown Vicinity

Over \$1300 damage has resulted from motor vehicle accidents on Georgetown's outskirts since the first of the month.

Ontario Provincial Police's North Halton detachment said the first occurred Thursday, February 1st on No. 7 Highway opposite Muri Allison Farm. The single vehicle accident involved a panel truck operated by Gerald Smallak of 28 Market Street, Georgetown, Ont. Carman Wright placed damage at \$300.

On Saturday, February 3, a car driven by Ray Wiles of Lincolnton and Joan Parker, RR 3, Brampton collided at the intersection of the Limehouse side-road and the 6th Line of Esqueping doing \$800 damage. Gt. Hudd investigated.

A second accident the same day on No. 7 Hwy. east of 7th Line of Esqueping involved a single car driven by John Smith of Guelph, Ont. Jordan estimated property damage here at \$250.

## Average Halton Farm Has Increased by Five Acres

Approximately 125 members and friends of the Normal Junior Farmers and Junior Institute heard Art Bennett, Director of Extension, Ont. Dept. of Agriculture, and Fred, speak in some of the changes that have taken place in Canada's agriculture during the last ten years. Mr. Bennett, who was Associate Agricultural Representative for Halton and Peel Counties for five years, returned to the county after eleven years, on the occasion of the Normal Junior Farmer Annual Banquet, held in Stewarttown hall, Friday, February 2nd.

Mr. Bennett said that we now have taller silos, larger tractors, and longer lower buildings, and that the average farm size in Halton County has increased from 143 acres in 1951 to 148 in 1966. Although there has been an increase in commercial farms in Ontario during the past five years, Halton County, because of heavy industrialization, has not followed this pattern. He stressed the importance of the Junior Farmer Movement in Ontario's Rural Youth Educational program. He had attended the Provincial Junior Farmer Leadership Training Camp for 7 years in a row, as a counsellor and participant, and found it

most encouraging to see young people returning to their home counties to assume active leadership roles, after spending a week at the Lake Couchiching Camp. Mr. Bennett also said that two of the greatest needs for farm people today is to be aware of the new technology in agriculture and to be able to adapt this knowledge to their own operations. 35% of Canada's labour force depends on agriculture for existence, and in addition ten thousand businesses are associated with the agricultural industry today.

Mrs. Bennett stressed that the major problem confronting farm people today is not pollution, or food for a hungry world, but the barrier between rural and urban people, and he challenged the Normal Junior Farmers and Junior Institute to meet this need and bridge the present gap in rural and urban relations. After the banquet, card tables were presented to Stan and Edna Hyatt, and Marg and Ronald Duncan, who had married within the last year. This is an annual custom followed by the Normal Jr. Farmers.

A very enjoyable dance concluded the evening.

NOW THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF ESQUEPING ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

From and after the passing of this By-Law the allowance for road described herein shall be closed and stopped up and conveyed to the adjoining owners.

ALL AND SINGULAR that certain parcel or tract of land and premises situate lying and being in the Township of Esqueping in the County of Halton and Province of Ontario and being composed of Ashbury Street and part of Spey Street in the Village of Spey-side in the East Half of Lot 15 in the Second Concession 2 in the said Township, as shown on Registered Plan Number 30 on file in the Registry Office for the said County of Halton, containing by ad-measurement 0.461 Acres be the same more or less and which said parcel of land is more particularly described as follows:
