Four Months on The Job Assistant C.A. Resigns

Haltoun county's recently hired assistant crown attorney has quit the job because there isn't enough "action."

Herbert Freshman QC, turned in his resignation less than four months after being hired as assistant to crown attorney Peter McWilliams.

His resignation was to avoid "vegetating," said Mr. Freshman.

The Burlington lawyer who is to concentrate on his Hamilton private practice was prosecuting on a part-time basis for 10 years in Haltoun county before being appointed permanent October 17.

The 55 year old barrister sent his resignation to the man who hired him originally, W. C. Bowman, director of public prosecutions.

Freshman made no secret of the fact that he was 'unhappy' about being confined mainly to traffic courts in Haltoun County. "Looking for courts of 'action' Mr. Freshman told the attorney general's department he would go to any other county. But he was told no position was available.
