8 Goal Splurge As Ajax Hammered By Raiders Here

With the boys' choir chanting "sieve, sieve, sieve" from their tier of pews in the east end of the Memorial Arena, Ajax goalkeepers Rick Morrison and Mike Willoughby developed jitters and beaded-ear drums in the third period of their Suburban Junior C semi-final against Georgetown Raiders, Sunday.

Raiders' opportunists pounced on the weakness to pump home eight goals in a little more than eight minutes and humble the visitors 10-2 in the best of seven series opener.

The collapse drained all the tension out of the important contest which was in doubt for a couple of periods.

Ajax gained the semi-finals by tripping Oakville Blades, Raiders waded through Streetsville to get to the second stage of the group playoffs.

Ajax racked the league pennant winners back on their heels in the first period when they fashioned a 2-0 lead in the early stages. Raiders got one back before the period ended and could only draw even in the next 20 minutes.

Georgetown's go-ahead goal at 6:02 of the third period was the cue for the vocal yowls to go to work on Morrison and while a steady river of rubber flowed into the Ajax net they entertained the 900 winging customers with imperfect harmony for the balance of the game.

Mike Willoughby relieved his mate and managed to stay out of the way while Raiders punched in their final three goals. Morrison masked up and finished in the net after Willoughby pulled a muscle.

Rick Black ended Cowbrough's shutout after 2 minutes and 51 seconds, unassisted, and John Horn put Black's pass into the Georgetown cage for a 2-0 lead at 7:44. Robinson put Raiders on the sheet while penalty killing at 9:30, Terry Hay assisting.

Brent McMullen poked desperately at a Bill Dwyer goal-mouth pass and deflected it home in the only scoring play of the middle period though Georgetown had several good chances earlier.

Ron Lane unassisted at 10:27, and Phil Lavell from Brad Johnson and Dave Sheppard at 14:38.

The majors were pinned on Raiders' Kent Robinson and Ajax's John Horton when they decided it was sock-it-to-me time behind the Raider net in the second period.

Lavell's Four Goals Help Oust Derbies from Playoffs
