NORVAL Fox was Rabid, Norval Pet Owners are Warned

A warning to all pet owners in the Norval district. Have your pets inoculated for rabies as soon as possible as a fox was shot on the farm of Jim Russell about 3 weeks ago and was found to be rabid.

Dogs in the village run in packs and many come in from surrounding farms so an outbreak of rabies could spread very quickly. Pet owners should realize that they have a responsibility to the community and should have their dogs and cats immunized against rabies if they are allowed to run loose. Children should be warned of the dangers of touching an animal that is acting queerly. Dogs are often running in the school area so it is up to the owners to see that they are immunized or are kept tied up so that no child will have to take the painful anti-rabies shots.

CWOSSA Champs, Now Seek Ontario Wrestling Crown

"Do you mean to say that your 157 pounder has only been wrestling for three weeks?"

"How do they form that pinning combination?" "Where do your wrestlers learn so many moves?"

These were the types of questions that the opposition coaches and teams were asking on Saturday, February 17, at Georgetown's Wrestling team scored a decisive win at the CWOSSA tournament. With over twenty schools represented at St. Jerome's in Kitchener the team scored 123 points, some 46 better than the next team Southwood of Galt.

The tournament victory will permit the entire team to journey to Belleville on Friday and Saturday to wrestle in the Ontario Championships.

This is the third year that Georgetown has won the CWOSSA tournament. The first year they were coached by Lyn McLean while the past two victories have been engineered by Joe Ingarozza.

The 157 pounder was George Henderson who defeated four opposing wrestlers to win the championship. Two of his opponents prior to meeting George had been defeated.

Papier at 194 was second in his weight class and was ahead on points before he was finally defeated by Perkins. This was one of the most exciting bouts of the tournament as each wrestler fought desperately to avoid being pinned in the early rounds.

Sean Bilshorow at 183 pounds pinned Inglis of John F. Ross. Previously these two had met with the victories going to Inglis. On Saturday it was a different story. Sean who had won two earlier matches used his skill and determination to pin the well-built Inglis and earn his first tournament victory.

Over fifty fans journeyed from Georgetown to support their team. After Ferguson and Jeweller had won their championships from wrestlers representing the Ontario School for the Blind, these fans led the

NOTICE OF APPLICATION to Dispose with a Vote of the Electors

TAKE NOTICE THAT:

1. The council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown intends to apply to the Ontario Municipal Board for approval of the construction of a new building for use as a Municipal Garage, Works Department and Offices, for the Town of Georgetown at an estimated cost of \$100,000, which amount shall be raised by the sale of debentures payable out of the general rate over a period not exceeding ten years.

2. Application will be made to the Ontario Municipal Board for an order to dispense with the assent of the electors to the undertaking of the said works. Any ratepayer may, within twenty-one days after the first publication of this notice, send by post prepaid to the Clerk of the Town of Georgetown at the address given below, a notice in writing stating his objection to such approval and the grounds of such objection.

3. The Ontario Municipal Board may order pursuant to the statute that the assent of the electors shall not be required and may approve of the said works, but before doing so, it may appoint a time and place for a public hearing when any objections will be considered.
