M.P.P. Wants Province to Adopt National Building Code

Haltom East M.P.P. Jim Snow, R. R. 2, Georgetown has placed a private member's bill on the order paper at Queen's Park, calling for the Ontario government to adopt the National Building Code.

Such a move, Snow said, would standardize building regulations for all municipalities throughout the province and provide a major step towards relieving the pressure of the housing crisis.

Big Problem

Snow, who is a building contractor himself, said that one of the biggest problems facing builders today is the fact that different municipalities have vastly different building regulations. Local rules vary about whether a builder can use dry wall or plaster, fire regulations differ, and even the size of building blocks and bricks that must be used in different areas, he said.

This variance in regulations, often forces building contractors to change plans for proposed buildings, Snow said. He added that by standardizing regulations the buyer might be able to

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Hog Producers \$75 Helps Farmers In Swaziland

The Haltom Hog Producers met at the Agricultural Office Milton, on Thursday, Feb. 15, for their annual meeting, under the chairmanship of Tom Broughton. It was reported that only four farmers had taken advantage of the \$10. bonus provided by the Haltom Hog Producers to farmers purchasing approved hogs. A special contribution of \$75. was given to Oxfam of Canada during the past year, to enable a farm in Central Swaziland, in Africa, to join their Producers' Co-Operative, and enable him to purchase some seed and fertilizer, and so improve his standard of living.

Mr. Ben Steers, President of the Ontario Hog Producers Association, discussed the changes in hog marketing during the past year. He stated that 1,000,000 extra hogs were marketed, with farmers receiving \$3,000,000 fewer dollars than in the previous year.

Achieve Service was presented with a gift in recognition of his fifteen years' service as secretary of the Haltom Hog Producers' Association, from February 1952, to February 1967.

District representatives chosen to the Ontario Hog Producers' Marketing Board for the next three years were Tom Broughton and Tom Foster, Delegates to the Ontario Hog Producers' Association Annual meeting were Delmar Ford, Allan Brownridge and Tom Broughton.
