

# LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

What do you do if the opponents bid you best suit before you get a chance to bid? If you're a good player you pass reasonably quickly and hope that partner will help you out. This hand was dealt at the Acton Bridge Club last week.

The dealer is North and North-South are vulnerable.

**SOUTH**  
S-K Q 8 4 3  
H-10 8  
D-A 7  
C-A 5 3 2

The bidding:  
NORTH EAST SOUTH WEST  
Pass 1 S Pass Pass  
2 C Pass 3 N T All Pass

Opening lead: 5 of hearts.

Both East and South have fine hands but East marlaged to bid spades first.

There is nothing that South can do but pass. I sat North and

when the bidding returned to me I wasn't prepared to sell out cheaply. I really should double but I decided, since we were vulnerable, to bid clubs.

South came to life and took a chance on three no trump. Little did South realize that the most valuable card in his hand was the heart ten.

The opening lead was ducked in dummy and East won with the King. Faced with leads up to tenaces in dummy in the red suits, East got off the lead with a spade, won by declarer. The club ace was taken and

a low club was led. East won and again led a spade won by south.

Declarer led a heart and finessed, winning the trick. The heart ace was taken and dummy's clubs were run. Poor East had to find three discards. One diamond and one spade were easy but what about the third discard?

Finally East parted with a diamond and declarer had no trouble winning three diamond tricks.

We were the only pair to be in game. One pair passed out

one spade which went down two for a top to East-West. Other North Souths played in clubs making three or four. At duplicate no player in North's seat would sell out to one spade on ten points.
