Six Businesses Open in New Buildings on Main Street North

Main Street North, east side, has undergone a startling transformation this past year.

Demolition of the old Christian Reformed Church and the Cordaro building and construction of two impressive new business blocks has made an attractive addition to the downtown business scene.

Originally built as a factory for the Croelman Company the Cordaro building has had many tenants in its history. When the Croelman firm closed down it was converted into business premises, and has had such tenants as a fish and chip shop, restaurant, TV store, clothing store, barber shop, while the upstairs floors were converted into apartments.

The building, adjoining Silver's Dept. Store, was acquired by Sid Silver last year and has been completely razed. In its place, Mr. Silver has built a fine new two-storey business block, with six main floor stores and offices on the second floor. Four established businesses have relocated there — Barber & Henley Travel Agency, Ryder's Television, Towne Sewing and Scotch Bakery. And Household Finance has opened a Georgetown Branch.

The next-door property, originally the terminal for the Toronto Suburban Railway, and later a dairy operated in turn by Ed Tyers, Riley Brethour and Irwin Noble, was purchased some years ago by the Christian Reformed Church and became their first workshop centre here. Bought by Halton and Peel Trust and Savings when the church built its new building on the 7th line, the old structure was razed. Last week the trust firm, which had located temporarily on Mill St., moved into a beautiful colonial style building on the site.
