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Lavell's Goal in Overtime Gives Raiders Third Win

Georgetown Raiders needed an overtime period to make Ajax Juniors pay 'uncle' in the third game of their suburban Junior C semi-final here Wednesday February 21.

When Phil Lavell came through with the winner early in the extra period to make it a 7-6 ball game it was the first time Georgetown owned a lead.

A determined band of Ajax white knights galloped into 3-0 and 5-3 leads as Raiders sought the scoring form that enabled them to run up double figures in their first two meetings.

It took a three goal third period to force the overtime that produced the backbreaker.

Ajax's Graham McKinnon had half of his club's 10 shots at Fred Cowbrough and three of them found holes. McKinnon notched two in a row and they Dan Piotrowski added one as Ajax manufactured a 3-0 lead in the first half of the first period.

Two goals by Brent McMullen from Ron Lane the first time, and Bill Dwyer and Lavell the second time, plus Terry Leswick's goal from Lane evened the count before the period was finished.

McKinnon and Al Paterson punched in the only second per-

iod goals putting the visitors back in command.

Raiders started to shave the margin after just two minutes of third frame when Paul Robinson struck from McMullen and Dwyer. Ajax lashed back with Sandy Ferguson's goal two minutes later.
