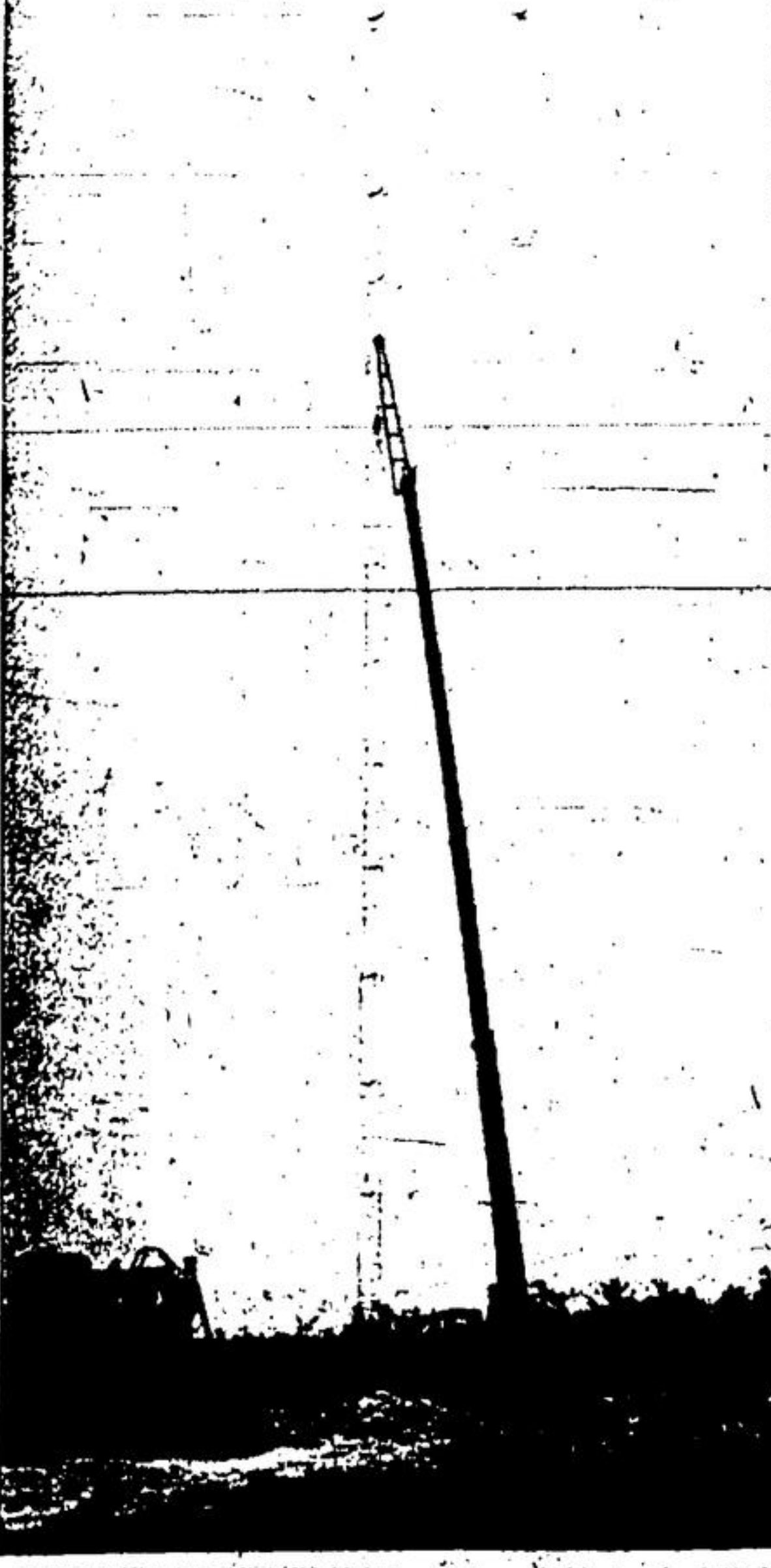

Twelve Bed Home. With the endorsement of the Government, the Association seeks to build a twelve bed home which Jim hopes the Branch will sponsor. At the conclusion of his talk to the Executive which was received favourably, Jim was instructed by President Bowman to obtain more facts and figures, and to bring them to the next executive meeting. A committee of two was formed to work with and assist Jim. Norm Ward and your PRO will be attending a meeting this week with the President of the Association who is an old friend of Branch 120 — Bill Ferguson, past president of Milton Branch.

Impressed. Zone Commander Bill Shields was impressed with the General Meeting and the speed with which the business was handled. He remarked on the successful Veterans Week last year, that it was the best organized in the zone. Ted Forester, house chairman of Oakville Branch who accompanied Bill, said 120 was the friendliest Branch he has visited.
