Says Christians Must be Concerned About the World

Can we be living Christians and not be concerned about the starving people in the world? Rev. Norman MacKenzie (M.A., D.D.), Personal Secretary of the Board of World Missions, was the guest speaker at the annual meeting of Halton Presbyterial held in Wellington Square United Church.

He held the large turnout stirred by the fruits that must be faced in our modern world. His statistics and charts on these serious conditions made one think and question. Only 16% of the world's population are white and yet control 75% of the world's wealth. What a responsibility to be put on our shoulders? What about the highly populated, poorer countries such as Asia, Africa and South America. How would you like to be Prime Minister of India and know that every day 30,000 children will be born?

How to feed and educate this increasing population. Grain is grown in India and also imported, but much of it never reaches the people. Cows and rats take their share first and important strikes are being taken between Christian workers and the government in India to alleviate these problems. Missionaries years ago wrote home saying the physical needs of the people have to be met before the spiritual needs can be filled. What can the church do?

More technical Christian men are being sent into these fields. We need an awareness that we must have a purpose, a real concern for people in desperate needs. How can we be Christians witnessing for God and live in our own little worlds.

Mrs. W. D. Stainton, incoming president and Miss Rayworth, president of Wellington Square U.C.W. welcomed those present. The worship service was conducted by First United Church, Port Credit. The finance committee reported a successful year, with the hope '68 would be as successful. A very

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R.R. Parker Named Head of Credit Valley Conservation

"The Select Committee on Conservation of the Ontario Legislature, although I think they started out with the idea that there was a lot to criticize, brought in a report which, if implemented, will strengthen the hand of the Conservation Authorities in Ontario," Fred Jackson told the inaugural meeting of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority last week. Mr. Jackson is the Supervisor of Special Services, Conservation Authorities Branch, Department of Energy and Resources Management.

"The Committee did an excellent job and many of the 127 recommendations are already in operation," he continued. "Those changes which deal with changes in the Conservation Authorities Act have been discussed with the executive of the Authority. Chairman and the bill will be introduced in the Legislature this session."
