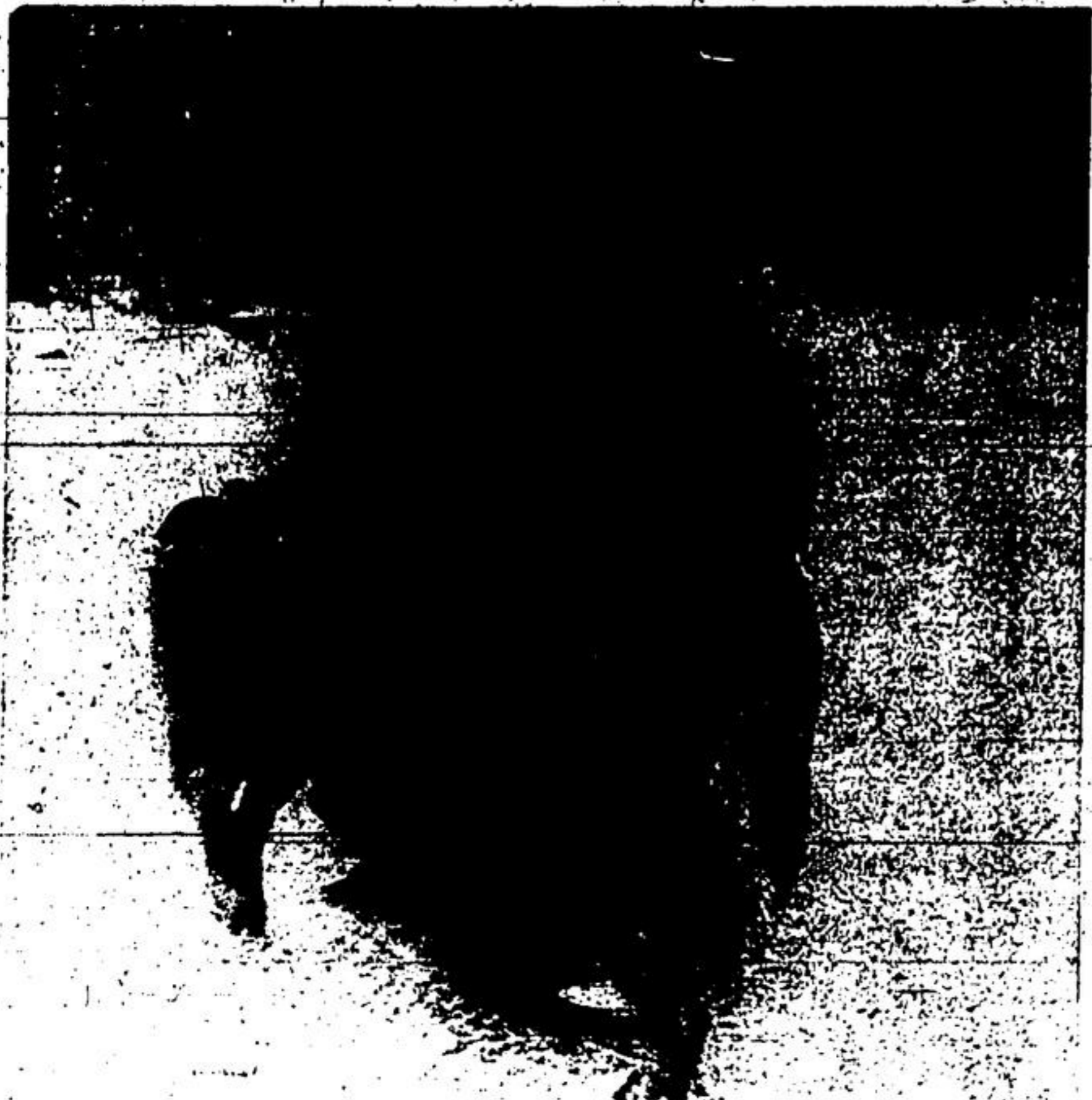


Wolf Stayed Out for Lunch Too Long

Raiders Even Milton Series Score 11-3 Sunday Victory

Georgetown Raiders outscored and out-fought Milton Merchants in Georgetown Memorial Arena Sunday afternoon to even their best-of-seven Suburban Junior C. final at one game each. Raider attackers picked Milton's defense apart for two periods to stack up an 11-1 lead and coast to an easy 11-3 victory.

Raiders halted the bombing when Merchants preferred hand-to-hand combat late in the second period. Open warfare at 16:47 erupted after a Milton player gave Raider rearguard Bob Larmand a stick across the Adam's apple as the play moved out of Georgetown territory.

Milton's Steve Gervais and Raiders' Terry Leswick drew red and out-fought Milton Merchants in Georgetown Memorial Arena Sunday afternoon to even their best-of-seven Suburban Junior C. final at one game each. Raider attackers picked Milton's defense apart for two periods to stack up an 11-1 lead and coast to an easy 11-3 victory.

At one point four Raiders were sitting astride four prostrate Merchants while their teammates did the belting and walzing.

The donnybrook produced the bulk of the game's 282 minutes in penalties. Officials slapped the teams with 22 minors, 22 misconducts and two fighting majors.

Even the two netminders, Brian Peavoy of Georgetown and Floyd Vaughan of Milton were tagged with misconducts.

The teams were forced to play from 16:47 of the middle period to 6:47 of the third. The lead with just four players on the ice and two on the bench as a result of the wholesale lockup.

Raiders were the lake charge team right from opening whistle and had beaten their rivals before the first period was over. They took a 6-1 lead into

the middle frame and pushed it into double figures before easing off.

Ron Lane and Bill Dwyer each fashioned hat tricks, Brent McMullen scored twice, and other Georgetown goals came from Paul Robinson, Phil Lavell, and Kent Robinson.

Steve Gervais scored twice and Don Hearnis once for the losers.

Paul Robinson, Terry Hay and Bob Larmand, the Raiders' hard-nosed defenseman, were the game's big playmakers with three assists apiece. Terry Leswick and Phil Lavell had two assists and Bill Dwyer and Ron Lane one each.

Craig Brush, Ted Hood, Jan Riddell and Graham Horn did the ground work on the Milton goals.

The game, which started at 2:30 took almost three hours to play, finishing at 5:25.

Most of the Milton contingent in the crowd of close to 1,200 slipped out long before it ended.

Hilkron Bants Lose To Guelph by 4-2

The first period saw the two teams battle each other to a scoreless tie. Then during the second period while killing a penalty Glen Robinson scored on a two on one break with Jamie Moody collecting an assist to give Georgetown a 1-0 lead. This lead stood up until the five minute mark of the third period when Guelph scored four quick unanswered goals within a span of five minutes. In an attempt to get back into the game in the final minutes of the contest Glen Robinson scored his second goal from Brian Barrett and Fin Arnold to make the final score 4-2.

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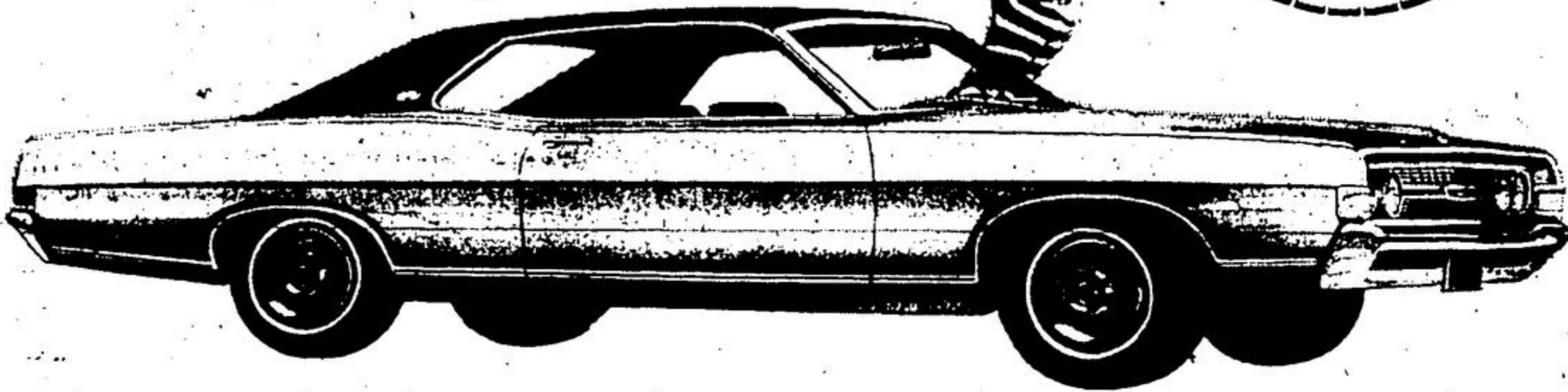
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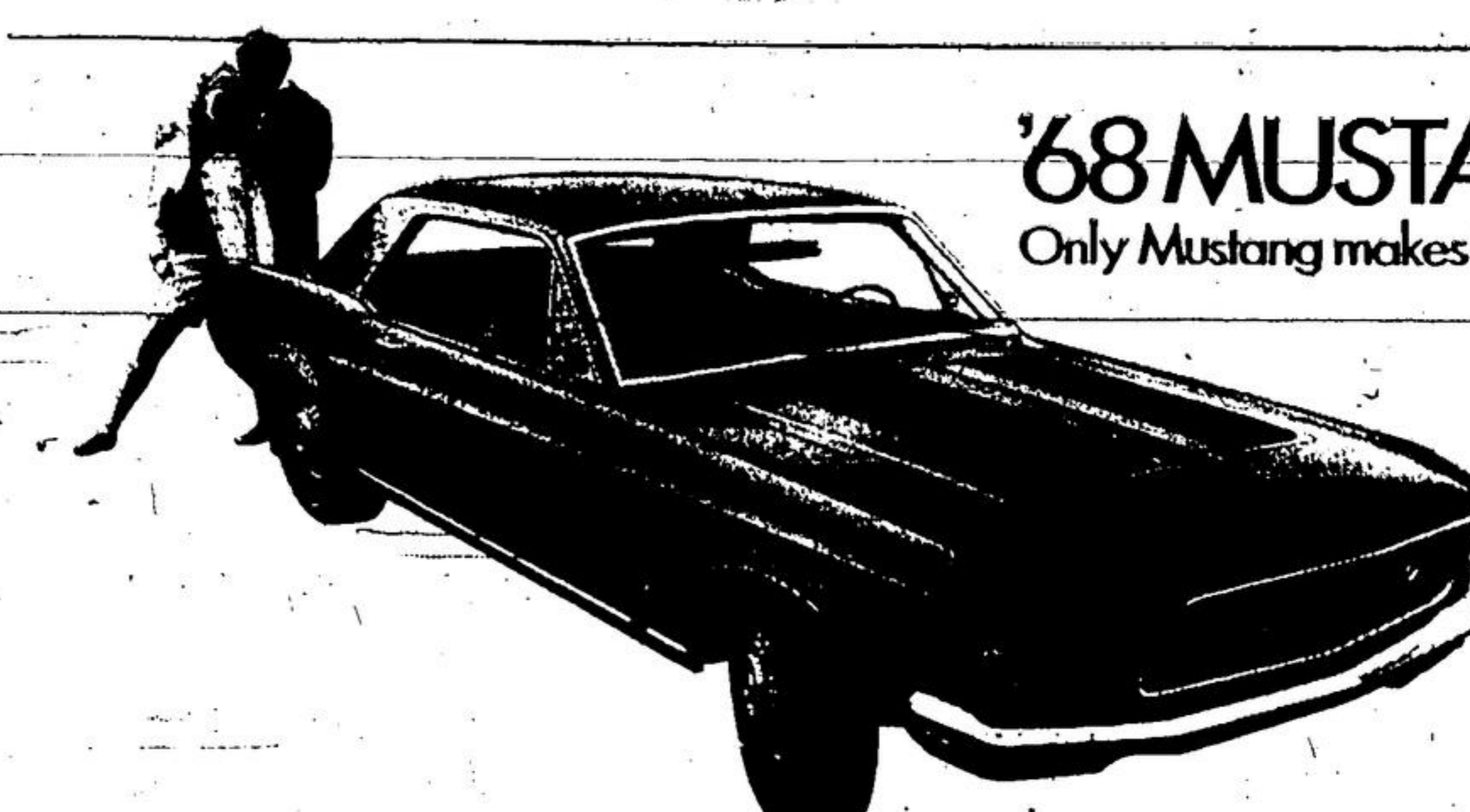
