

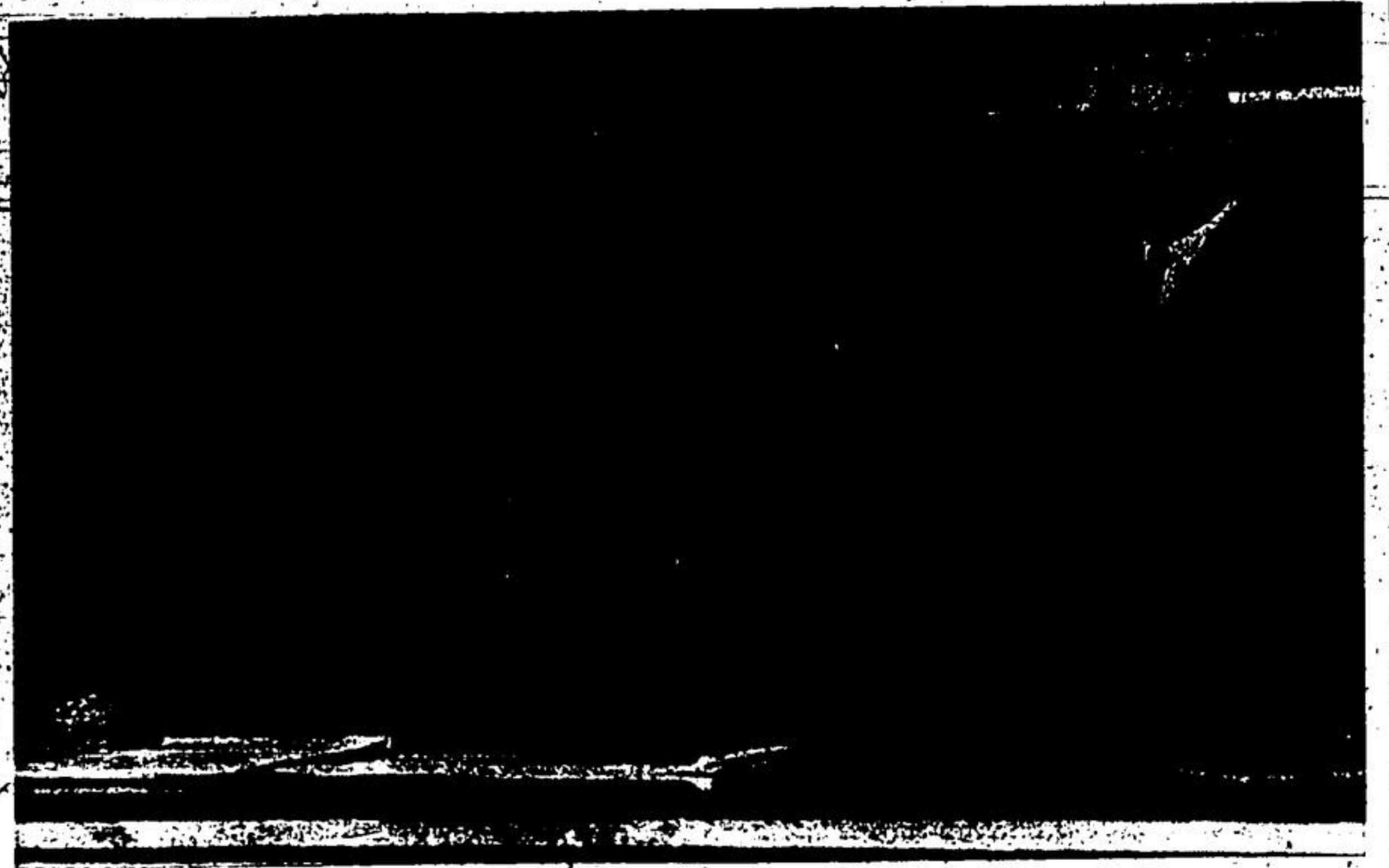
Life-Saving Award to Wayne McNiven

\$90,000 Project Will Add More Capacity to Bell Plant

Telephone users in the Georgetown area are to be provided with increased dial switching facilities this year, according to H. A. Blachford, Bell Canada Manager for this area.

Crews have moved into the Georgetown exchange to commence installation of 1,000 new lines and 1,000 terminals, increasing the telephone-handling capacity of the exchange to more than 6,100 main phones.

Also included in the project will be installation of additional power generating equipment.

Mr. Blachford reported that the extension is scheduled for completion by early summer at an estimated cost of more than \$90,000.
