## Medical Services Considered Merger With Larger Co-Op

Halton Co-Operative Medical Services, a member-owned group that has provided a medical health plan for the past 21 years, lost both members and money during 1967, reports at the annual meeting on Saturday indicated.

As a result, the group is considering a merger with a larger cooperative which will help offset its growing administration costs. Discussion at Saturday's annual failed to arrive at a final decision, due to a poor turnout of members but the directors were authorized to continue negotiations with the Central Co-Op (formerly Peel and York Co-Op) which merged recently and opened a central office at Snellgrove.

A drop in membership from 825 to 770 coupled with an increase in doctors' fees. Last April were blamed for the net loss of \$3310 the Service reported for the year. Earned premiums income was \$80,037; claims incurred totalled \$74,774 and administrative expenses were \$16,658 to show a loss of \$11,395 on operations. In 1966 the Service showed a \$15,358 surplus.

Members' equity stands at \$21,822 and total assets are \$107,292.

The Dept. of Insurance of the Ontario Government ordered the Co-Op to raise its rates by 15 per cent to offset the raise in medical fees. This resulted in an increased premium, for some members, for only half the year and resulted in the loss in the financial report.

"We are concerned about that loss, but not so much as about the loss in membership and the resultant loss in income," vice president William R. Hume told the annual meeting. "Do we advertise enough? Should we employ a salesman?" he wondered.

President Sam Finnie Sr. conducted the annual meeting, held following a dinner at Bethel United Church, Drumquinn. Rev. K. Hawkes offered grace and the secretary Mrs. Frank Mullin introduced the guests.

Greetings were extended to Halton MP Dr. Harry Harley, Halton East MP James Snodgrass, Halton Warden William F. Hunter of Georgetown and Cr. Donald Gordon of Oakville.

John James, provincial secretary of the Ontario Federation of Medical Co-Operatives and William Bradshaw, the Federation president both spoke at length. Discussions were held with M. Bridgen and Mrs. B. Ollif of the Central Co-Op at Snellgrove. Another guest was Professor R. Forshaw of the Wellington Co-Operative.

Director Clifford Brown presented Halton's financial report. Auditors G. H. Ward and Patners of Welland were reappointed for another year.

Directors Sam Finnie, Arthur B. Harris, Albert Hunter, and George Robertson were re-elected to three year terms on the

board of directors. Mrs. Fred Edwards was appointed a director to fill a vacancy on the board caused by the resignation of Dr. J. Turvey. Other Co-Op directors include Thomas Alderson, W. R. Hume, F. M. Wilson, Harold C. Bigger, R. I. Davidson, Clifford Brown, and Mrs. Roy Wilson.

## Mrs. Walter T. Evans Historian, Camera Fan

The former Dora Kathleen Stewart, she was the daughter of the late John Stewart and Jane Frazer. She lived in the Okanagan Valley in British Columbia, coming to Georgetown after her marriage in 1952. She had been employed with Canadian Pacific Railway in Penticton, B.C.

She was predeceased by her husband in 1962. She leaves four stepchildren, Ruth and James F. Evans, Georgetown, Mrs. R. M. Smale (Jean) of Burlington, and Mrs. Charles S. Jeffrey (Margaret) of Queensville. She was predeceased by brothers Alan, Douglas and Roy Stewart of Summerland, B.C.

## Blasts Automakers for 160 Per Mile Vehicles

Auto manufacturers who make and advertise cars capable of excessive speeds were castigated by Halton's Crown Attorney Peter K. McWilliams last week.

Commenting on a case in which a motorist was given a suspended sentence by Magistrate Kenneth M. Langdon for driving his car at 160 miles per hour, Mr. McWilliams said he agreed with the magistrate's contention that a limit should be placed on the speed of which a car is capable.

"I agreed with Magistrate Langdon that it is a shocking situation when the automobile companies can make cars that can reach 160 miles per hour. They should be prosecuted for selling cars capable of that speed. It is ridiculous to set a maximum speed limit of 60 miles per hour and allow cars to be built capable of more than twice that speed."

He said the manufacturers are catering to people's "lust for speed."

In sentencing the 160 miles per hour driver the Georgetown magistrate said he had never encountered such a case in all his 25 years on the bench.
