July 4 through 6 are the dates of the Carling Miller golf tournament to be hosted by Georgetown Golf and Country Club. The Miller is part of the nine-tourney CPGA 50th Anniversary Canadian Tour.

July 3 will see a Pro-Am at Georgetown Golf in which 128 professionals and 138 amateurs will compete.

100 pro in the Miller will receive \$10,000, and there will be \$20,000 in prizes for Pro-Am winners.

Hosts of the Miller is the current holder of the Miller title. The 1966 winner was the USPGA golf tour past setter George Knudson.

The Miller is the third event on the nine-event Canadian Tour. It opens June 6 with the Ontario Open; the Quebec Open runs June 27-29; Miller Trophy July 4-6; Manitoba Open July 11-13; Saskatchewan Open July 18-20; British Columbia Open Aug. 8-10; CPGA Championship at Quebec City Aug. 23-27 and Maritimes open Aug. 28-30.

Again it was Milton's hot goalie that burned Raiders. The performance was of Rick and Jim Cole and Don Hearn accounted for three of Merchants' four goals including the tying and winning markers.

Rick Cole knocked in Don Hearn's chest high shot from the edge of the crease at 11:33 of the third period to create the tie-all tie.

Minutes later Rick Cole pasted Ed Hearn who took two saves as the puck before flip-pur his own rebound just under the crease.

Rick Cole also scored the first goal of the game at 4:09 of the opening period while many in the silent crowd were still finding a place to stand.

Coat Smith fired the other Milton goal half way through middle period to chop Raiders' lead to 3-2.

Jerry Har scored Georgetown's first at 5:15 from Ron Lane and the first period ended with the teams deadlocked at 3-3.

The win, the second straight double figure trouncing laid on the Merchants, gave Georgetown the series lead, two games to one.

Coaches Ed Swice and Gerry Ingles and players Rick Cole and Kent Robinson were spectators at this one. Swice of Milton and Ingles of Raiders received two game suspensions for allowing players to come over the boards and John In-a-slug-up at centre ice during game two.

Though game three was typically chippy with 10 minors and one major to Milton being levied by the officials, both teams concentrated on hockey. Terry Leswick, a Georgetown Raider among the league's top ten points men, concentrated on goals and fired five of them to spearhead the Georgetown charge.
