

Raiders Cop Crucial Fifth Game, One Win From Title

Shake Off Three Goal Deficit To Down Milton 5-3 Sunday

Scoring five times without a reply from Milton artillery, Georgetown Raiders turned sure defeat into sweet victory Sunday in the fifth game of the best of seven Suburban Junior C league final.

A crowd of just under 1,000 in Georgetown Memorial Arena watched Raiders play half a hockey game. Unfortunately for

the Milton faithful who added their vocal cords to Merchants' domination in the early going, it was the last half and it was too much for their commanding lead to absorb.

Raiders scored twice in quick succession in the second period, and then kept the ball rolling in the third period with three goals.

Roger Wildfang from Ted Hood sent Merchants into a 1-0 lead early in the opening per-

iod, and Jim Chalkley from Graham Itern and Kevin Hall doubled it before the period was out.

Raiders were looking at a 3-0 deficit by the middle of the second period after Craig Brush scratched the inside of the goal post to finish off an unassisted thrust.

A pair of Terrys, Leswick and Hay, started undermining Merchant foundations at 12:36. Leswick, one of the league's deadliest men within shooting distance, of a net, capped the play which involved a lot of toiling on Hay's part.

Cheers were still rebounding off the steel beams when Bill "Hummer" Dwyer converted Paul Robinson's pass into Raiders' second goal.

Georgetown backers had to wait until the fourth minute of the last period for the tying goal. Brent McMullen pumped it into the back of the net from 15 feet out, Bill Dwyer and Paul Robinson the assisters.

Leswick's needle-threading accuracy was never better demonstrated than on the winning goal. Lee gave him four inches of daylight on his stick side and Leswick used it to score from a sharp angle. Bob Larm and Ron Lane assisted on this one.

Milton's designs to tie were set back with five minutes left when Raiders scored a power play goal. From a face off to the right of Merchant net, Leswick drew the puck back to Paul Robinson who slapped it into a top corner.

For the second game in a row shots on goal were even, but the totals shrunk to 26.

With Georgetown a man short Juri Kudrasov was penalty killing when he pounced on a sloppy pass, worked in close to the Trenton net and triggered Georgetown's insurance goal at 3:20. Georgetown tightened defensively and made the 6-4 difference stand up for the rest of the extra period.

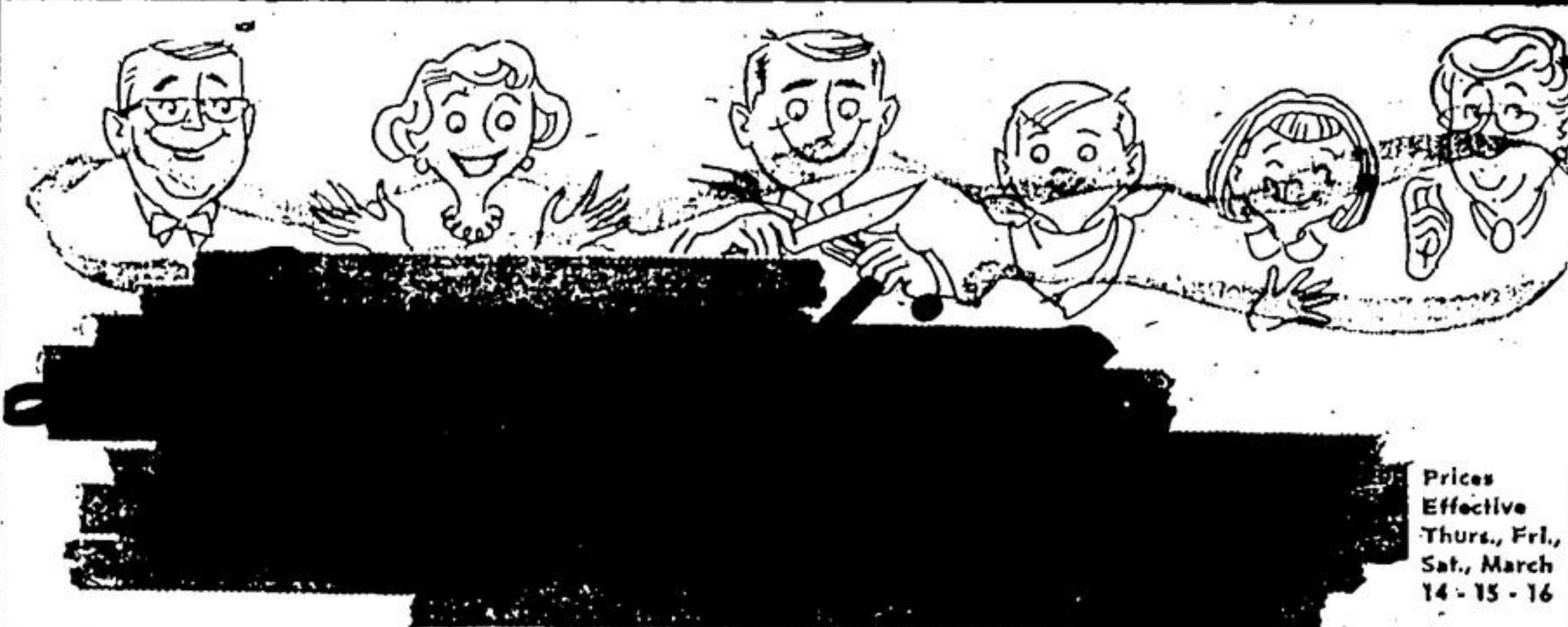


TROPHIES IN MEMORY OF FORMER LITTLE LEAGUERS
