

Georgetown Bantams Champions In 4-Town Hockey Tournament

Saturday March 9th 4-Town Tournament held in Acton was a good success as championships were divided by three towns.

Georgetown Bantams defeated Acton for the Bantam championship; Acton Pee Wees defeated Milton for the Pee Wee championship and Milton Novices defeated Georgetown for Novice championship.

Naturalists View Film Made in Credit Valley

An excellent film made last year "Valleys and People" was shown to members of Georgetown & District Naturalist club at their February meeting in First Baptist Church Hall.

Jack Bailey of Streetsville, guest speaker, outlined the history and purpose of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. He said one major project is the building of a dam north of Orangeville which will cost a million dollars, including purchase price of land.

The CVCA serves 365 square miles in the Credit River watershed. Among conservation areas in the region are Terra Cotta, Linehouse, Meadowdale, Wilcox and Caledon Lake.

Mr. Bailey left with the club, copies of a folder which outlines the CVCA and which includes a map of the watershed—most useful for naturalists and hikers.

Club president Mr. Cramp announced plans for future meetings, the next to be on March 19 at which time a photo contest will be held.

Won't Authorize Architect Till OMB Approves Schools

Delays on approvals for both Centennial School addition and Moore Park School, again brought a delegation from the public school board to council, Monday night.

School board vice chairman, Chris Walker asked council for permission to hire an architect for Moore Park School despite

the fact O.M.B. approval had not been received. He explained it was an effort to get something started.

The mayor stated the situation was no further ahead than it had been at the last school board visit. He claimed the town solicitor had been informed the O.M.B. would consider neither project until the capital

Council Investigates Charge 'Burma Road' in Subdivision

Branding Fagan, Flamingo and Chelvin Drive the "Burma Road", Hugh Powell told council Monday night of the deplorable conditions in the areas under construction.

An unusual twist in a complaint was the public thanking of Cr. W. Smith and Steve W. Hunter for their help in obtaining a grader and operator from the builder, who up till then had disclaimed responsibility.

Mr. Powell wanted to know the person to contact when the road needed scraping. "I realize paving at this time is impossible, but we still have to get in and out," he added.

He also suggested an emergency "No Parking" sign be placed on these streets, since people come into look at these houses, and park all over.

John Anderson, who lives next door to the Alcan model homes told of missing his plane flight last Sunday since a car was parked across his driveway. "As an individual I have contacted Alcan and got nowhere," he added.

Cr. Smith advised them to

continue to contact Frank Morrice. "He has all the names of the people at Alcan, Metro Hulton, Wimpey and Skopit," said Cr. Smith.

As a last resort, Cr. Smith said he would go along with the "No Parking" area. "If the people have to park blocks away they won't go to see Alcan Homes, that'll get some action out of Alcan."

Council decided to ask a representative from Alcan Homes to attend the next council meeting to discuss the roads in the Chelvin, Fagan, Flamingo area.

forecast for this year had been approved. "The treasurer says no forecast has been submitted by your department."

Mr. Walker pointed out that the school board had only received the capital forecast request on Friday. "We would like to engage the architect and get the drawings started, while the approval is being sought."

In answer to the mayor's query about the cost of an architect, C. Walker replied the fee is 6% and the cost of the school is \$250,000 or approximately twelve thousand dollars.

While admitting the chance of refusal was remote, the mayor wondered who paid the architect if the OMB disapproved. He also questioned their reaction to any premature move on the part of council.

The mayor suggested one of more of the schools could be equipped with a library which could be used by the public, and asked the board to consider other than one-storey schools.

C. Walker informed council the Board had all but made up their mind that Moore Park would be a two storey school.

He pointed out there would be a school library at George Kennedy and in the addition to Centennial.

"The decision as to public use is out of our hands," he explained "there is some higher government library agency which disapproves of this action."

After assuring the delegat-

ion the motion would probably find favour later in the meeting, council had a few doubts about the legality of authorizing an architect prior to OMB approval, and withheld the motion to hire the architect until next week.

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
