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### Planning 30 Mile Oxfam Walk

### Look for 5000 Participants

Seven checkpoints where OXFAM walkers can rest, get refreshments and even repair blistered feet, were named at a meeting of the OXFAM Walk committee Thursday.

The May 4 walk, which organizers hope will attract 5,000 walkers, covers a 30 mile route from Brampton to Hornby, through Georgetown, Norval, Huttonville and finishes back in Brampton.

Checkpoints will be set up at Scout House on Steeles Avenue, St. Stephen's Anglican Church at Hornby, Holy Cross R.C. Church in Georgetown, Norval Presbyterian Church, and the EMO building on the Huttonville sideroad west of Brampton. The walk will start and end at St. Mary's auditorium in Brampton.

The Halton Peel walk, as this one has been labelled, is one of about 20 such OXFAM walk which will take place all across Canada on the same date. They are being staged in aid of the millions of humans in the world who suffer from malnutrition, disease and illiteracy.

Through the local walk Halton and Peel residents may join with the other walkers to express their concern for the world's desperately needy. People who don't wish to take part in the walk can help by sponsoring a walker.

When sponsoring a walker a person or business agrees to pay him or her a certain amount for each mile completed. For example if a walker travels 10 miles and the agreement is for \$1. per mile then the sponsor contributes \$10 to relieve world hunger. In many cases walkers are their own sponsors.

The OXFAM walks alone raised nearly \$378,000 during 1967. Of this amount the Peel Centennial Walk from Brampton to Cooksville and back last fall, brought in nearly \$40,000. Direct expense amounted to just \$350. A thousand walkers took part in that outing, and organizers are aiming to attract five times that many in the May 4 hike.

As well as check points and comfort stations with limited refreshment, car transportation for drop-outs, and police patrol, are also provided.

Fun, a sense of accomplishment, plus weary feet, and a certificate for those who complete the walk are guaranteed. Half of the hordes which started the September walk on Highway 10 went the full 35 miles.

Walk chairman is Al Moulton, secretary Bruce Adlam and checkpoint director Frank McCullough, all of Brampton. Local members of the committee are Walter Ridley, and Dave Dunlop of Norval, and Sam Jones, Terry Harley, Marjorie Nazer and Angeliki Sommer of Georgetown.
