


# SUNDAY BELONGED TO THE SONS O'ERIN

## Poll Egg Producers' Opinion On Single Marketing Agency

Thousands of Ontario egg producers from the small family concerns to the large corporations, will be asked next month to give the Ontario Egg and Poultry Producers' Marketing Board power to set up a single agency for marketing eggs.

The scheme, outlined to Halton Egg Producers' Association last week in Hornby, met with a mixed reception and plenty of questions.

The plan was outlined by John Stewart-Smith, secretary-manager of the board.

He said there were a number of high production farms which would produce a large egg surplus and low prices.

Stewart-Smith said the board had to make efforts in all ways possible to contend with competition from foreign markets, particularly from the United States and England.

He said the board wanted all eggs, bar certain exemptions, to be marketed through a single agency, and asked for support of Halton producers at a delegates convention to be held in Toronto next month.

Other eggs would be subject to marketing via the board's new agency.

"It is intended to make such exemptions which are felt are in the best interests of the industry," he added.

He was unable to say what the quota figures would be.

Stewart-Smith, in a panel discussion later, said the board would still have no power over imports to Canada as that was a federal responsibility.

Producers must express once and for all what they want the board to do," he added.

Stewart-Smith added: "It must be made clear that eggs sold direct to the consumer are exempt from any direct regulations of the board."

Quotas would be assessed on the number of laying hens on each farm.
