

Glen, Norval Rector Has New Parish in Hamilton

Rev. Harold Llewellyn will be officiating at his last services at St. Alban's, Glen Williams and St. Paul's, Norval on Easter Sunday.

Mr. Llewellyn, rector of the 3-church Anglican parish for three years, begins new duties the next day as rector of St. Michael's Church, Hamilton.

The parish, on the Hamilton east mountain, is one of the largest in Niagara diocese, and the church was built about five years ago to serve a continually increasing population in that part of the city.

The Glen and Norval were the first parishes served by Mr.

Llewellyn after his ordination in 1965. A Hamilton native, he had held executive positions with Anthes-Imperial in St. Catharines and later with a Hamilton firm. He is past chairman of Hamilton Chapter, Society of Cost Accountants. He was director of stewardship for the diocese before becoming a minister.

He will be resigning his position as newly elected chairman of Georgetown and District Y.M.W.C.A. when he leaves for his new post.

Mr. and Mrs. Llewellyn have three daughters the eldest in her graduating year is nursing at a Hamilton hospital.

Plan Six Storey Apartments, Campbell Gate, Mountainview

Alter. Investments who propose to build two, six storey apartment buildings at the corner of Campbell Gate and Mountainview Road, offered to purchase fifteen feet of a laneway at the rear of their property belonging to the town.

At Monday's council meeting Cr. Roy Ballentine explained it was a laneway originally designated for backdoor delivery to proposed stores in the area, which were never built. By acquiring the land the apartment could have access and exit behind the apartment buildings instead of on Mountainview Rd.

The proposed apartment buildings, not yet approved, would have eighty-eight suites plus garages.

The offer to purchase was turned over to committee.

Says Trudeau Not First Choice of Halton Delegates

The head of the Halton wants Trudeau for prime minister committee says the justice minister's recent Saturday morning visit had "very little effect" on the six local delegates to the upcoming leadership convention.

Derek Mason said Trudeau made a "very favourable impression" on the delegates "but I don't think (he) changed their minds."

"As a first choice, I don't think any more than two local delegates intend to vote for Mr. Trudeau but I would say as many as four would give him their second choice," Mason said.

The fact that the justice minister is getting a noticeable amount of second ballot support across the country indicates he will be in the running until the last ballot, he said.

A local poll taken at a Halton Liberal function the night before Trudeau arrived was overwhelmingly in favour of the justice minister. About 150 people voted in the poll.

Add New Fire Safety Film to Library Bureau

A new film, "Safety with Fire" will soon be added to Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau's film library, and made available for showing to organizations throughout the county.

A film night was held at the Bureau's March meeting in Georgetown Fire Hall last week, when members saw three films on fire prevention, and decided to buy one. The film the Bureau is purchasing deals with campfires, electrical hazards in homes, kitchen and grease fires, bonfires, storage of combustible materials and planning a fire escape. Bureau chairman Jim Coulson of Milton describes it as "an excellent film that should be seen by every citizen of Halton."

The Bureau has an extensive library of films and coloured slides, and member departments in Milton, Acton, Georgetown and Oakville would be pleased to select a suitable film or slide series for showing to women's groups, service clubs, farm and church organizations, Scout and Guide groups or Home and School Associations.

During the same meeting, members of Burlington Fire Department showed an interesting film on poison control.

The Bureau chairman and one other delegate will be attending a fire prevention officer's course in Niagara Falls in May. The course is sponsored by the Ontario Municipal Fire Prevention Officers Association. Chairman Coulson said the Bureau's second delegate will probably be from Acton or Georgetown Fire Department, and will be named at the Bureau's April meeting.

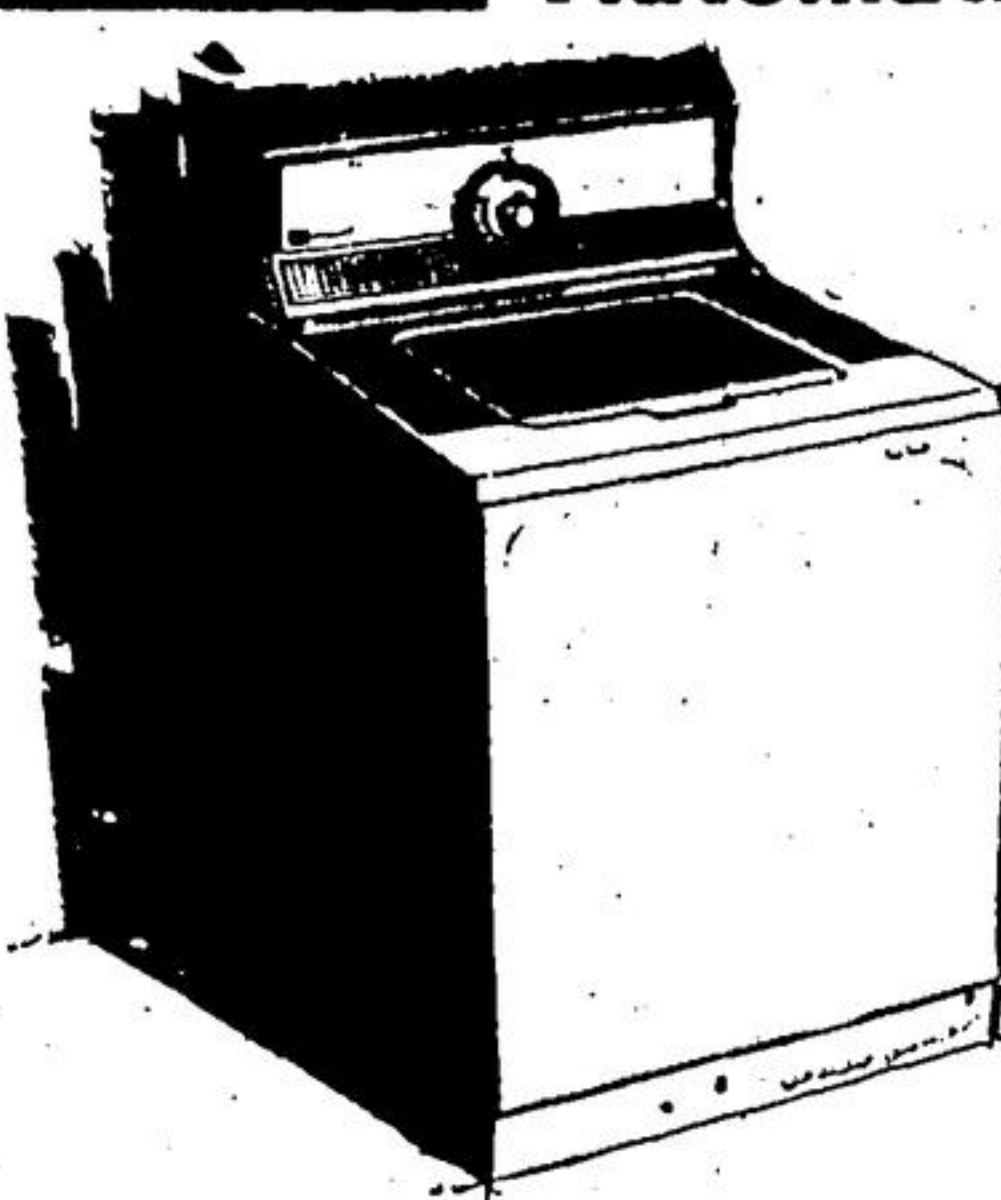
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
