

Costume Ball Would Open Museum's Display Building

A grand costume ball, with an orchestra playing in the balcony and guests in old-fashioned costumes dancing on the main floor below, is planned to mark the opening of the new display building at Halton Museum.

The new building, located next to the two existing display buildings, was a centennial project of the county and painters are now putting finishing touches to the inside of the large, light, two-storey structure.

The main display area, in the building, is comprised of the first floor, which has two floors on all sides, leading to the balcony. The orchestra will sit in the U-shaped balcony which is attached to three walls of the building.

There are two stairways leading from the main floor to the balcony.

"We're hoping to have the costume ball to mark its opening sometime in June," said Major H. J. Newman of Georgetown, the Halton museum curator.

Two other display areas now before open to the public could be ready by Easter week-end, Major Newman said.

"The top two floors of the main building here will definitely be open by Easter," Mr. Newman said. "And we're hoping that we can have the wiring completed in the Craft House by then."

The Craft House is a small building located between the main building and the new building which stand at right angles to one another, and form the edge of a grassy courtyard area.

In addition to having the Halton museum, the Kelso area — just south of Highway 401 — should soon be the site of a provincial agricultural museum and a permanent display site for the steam equipment belonging to the Ontario Steam and Antique Preservers' Association.

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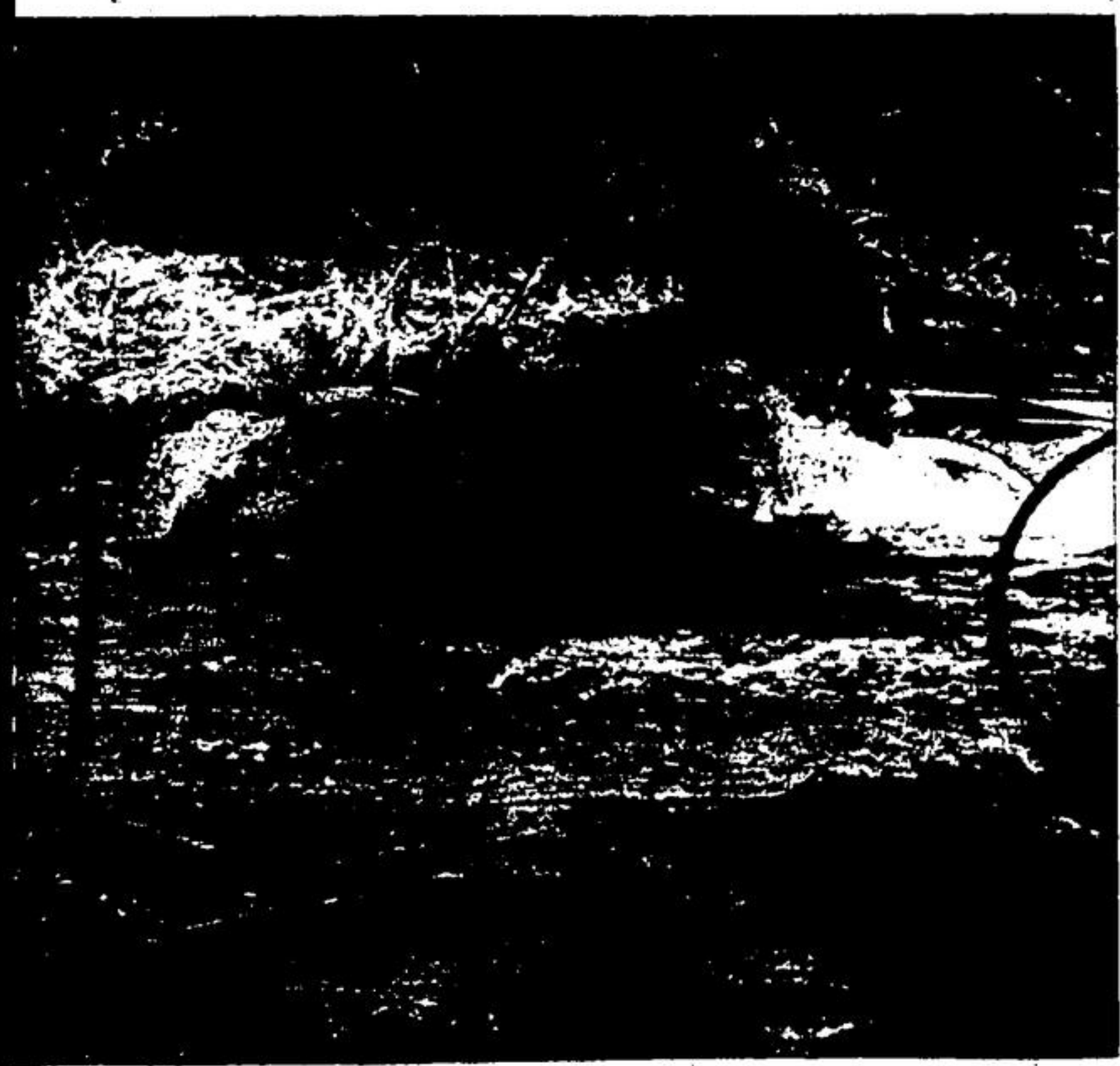
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WATCH OUT FOR THE PUDDLE

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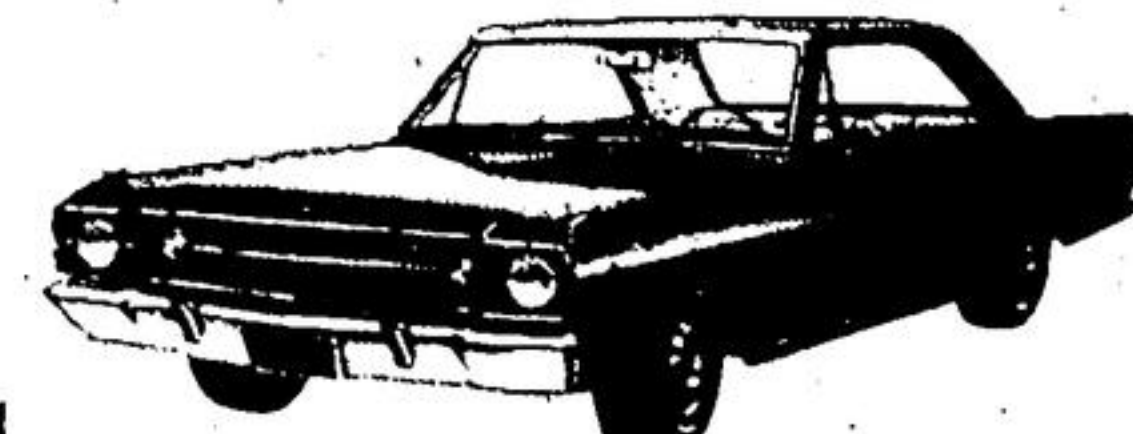
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
