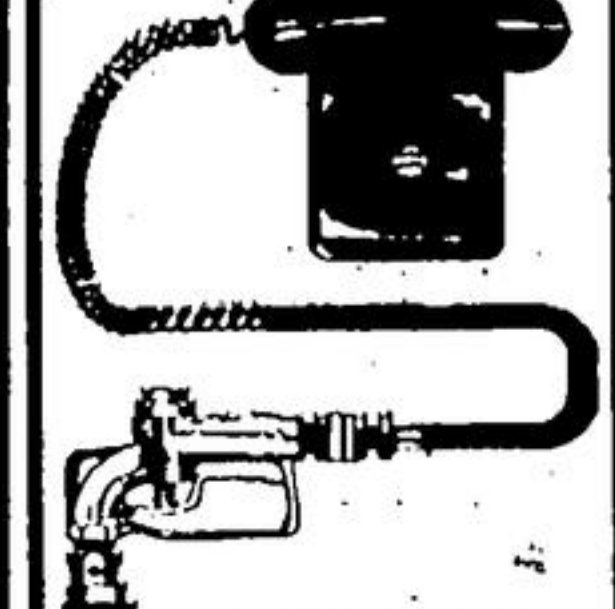

Georgetown Raiders have another flock of Merchants between them and the OHA Junior C finals.

Raiders, who bankrupted Milton Merchants to snatch the Suburban League title, are currently knee deep in the Ontario semi-finals with Merchants from Huntsville, and like their Halton namesakes, the Huntsville breed are stiff competition.

The first period ended in a 2-2 tie, but Raiders knuckled down in the middle period to open a 6-4 gap. Huntsville had the only scoring play of the third, and that with less than a minute left.
