COUNCIL BRIEFS

An offer to purchase part of lot 29, beside Canada Bread and Balmer Candy Co., by Georgetown Woodworking Ltd. was turned over to the Industrial Committee.

A 7,500 square foot plant is planned on the one and a half acre site.

The town will ask confirmation from the Separate School Board that they are no longer interested on the property on Pennington Cres. The confirmation is necessary, if the by-law closing the road is to be repealed.

A letter from the town solicitor told council, in their opinion streets in new areas are still public highways, giving the police power to enforce the highway traffic Act.

Two readings were given to a by-law authorizing the reconstruction of Silvercreek sanitary trunk sewer, and other sewers. This is the first phase, with the cost amounting to \$239,492.

Permission was given to the Kinsmen to use the park Saturday June 8, for a Hell Drivers Show.

Council endorsed a recommendation of the Georgetown Hydro Commission to have all new subdivisions equipped with underground wiring. This would

apply also to Bell Telephone and Cable Television.

Council approved the erection of signs at Georgetown Decorating, Mill Street, and Halton Peel Trust, Main Street.

Cr. Hole asked council if there was a by-law under which people burning trash, and through carelessness causing grass fires, could be prosecuted. The mayor said he was sure there was but he would check.

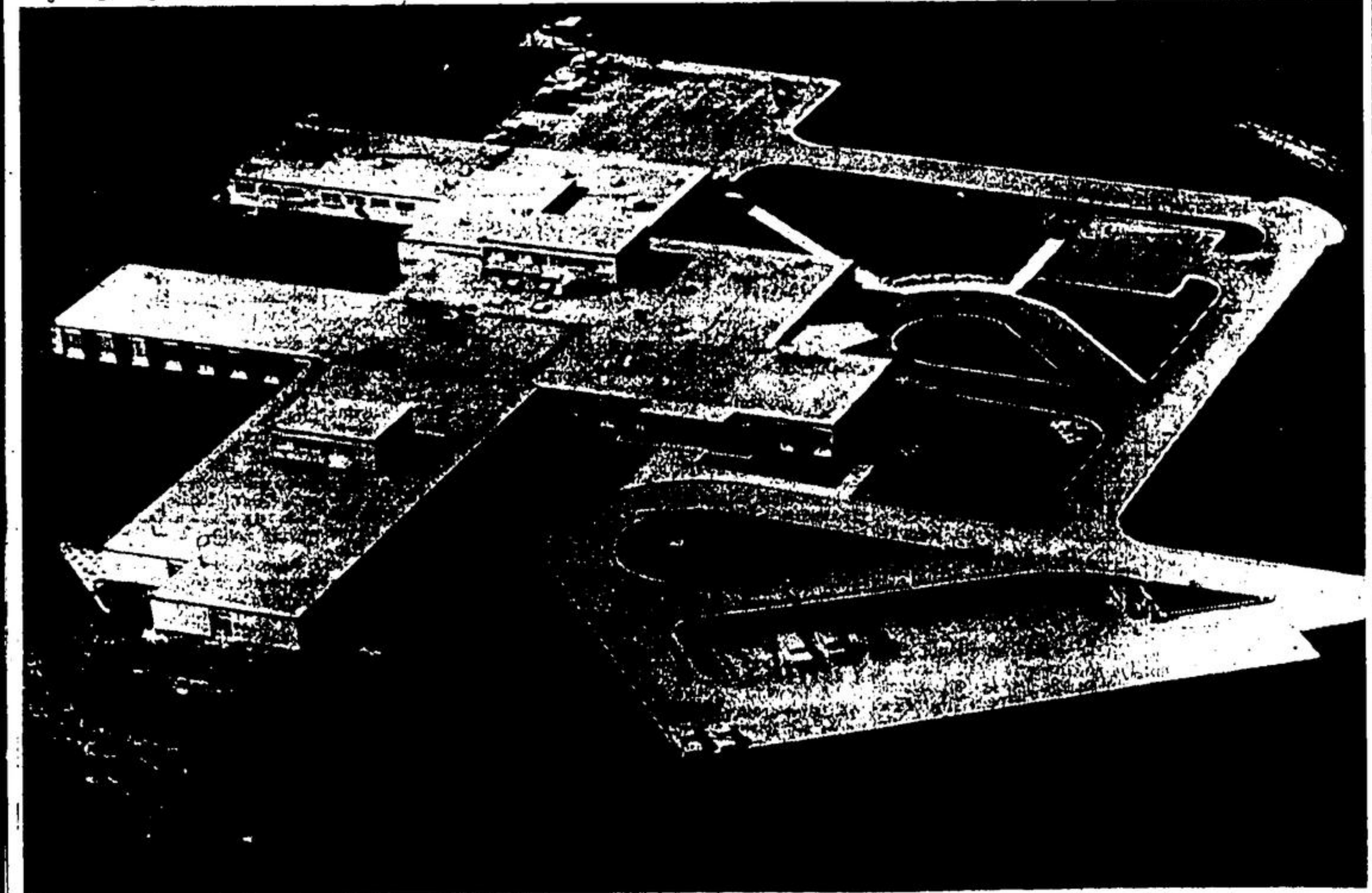

HOSPITAL'S FIRST ADDITION IN PLANNING STAGES

GEORGETOWN COUNCIL WAS ADVISED at a recent meeting by Georgetown and District Hospital Administrator that an architect has been engaged to plan a 31 bed addition. Two thirds of the cost will be available in government grants and 1/3 must be raised locally. It will be the first addition to the Georgetown hospital since Health Minister Matthew Diamond officially opened it in 1961. For the past year the rate of occupancy in the medical-surgical ward in particular has been teetering on the saturation point.
