

Huntsville Hurdled, Raiders Face New Hamburg In Finals

Raiders Remember '66 Title Match
This Time Ontario Honours At Stake

Georgetown Raiders have a score to settle with New Hamburg Hahns. Two springs ago it was the Hahns who dangled the group championship in front of Raiders eyes by taking top-dog losses in the early games of the finals and then snatched away the glory with an overtime goal in the seventh game.

Now fate has placed the Raiders and Hahns back in the same ring, but this time it's the Ontario Junior C' title on the line.

New Hamburg, playing in a Central Ontario group, won that level by dumping Waterloo, last week, they pole-vaulted into the finals by knocking off Paris four games to one.

Raiders have waded through Milton Merchants in the Suburban League final, Dresden Kings, and Huntsville Merchants to get to Hahns.



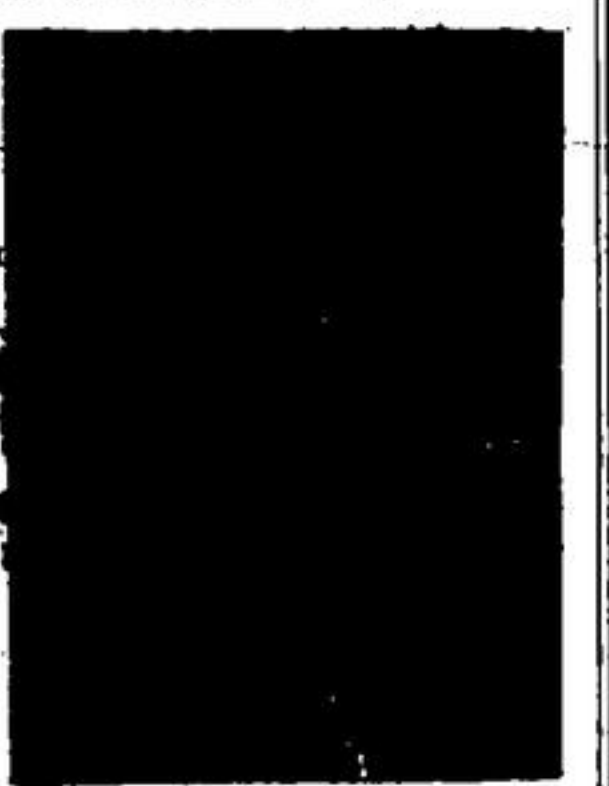

The best of 7 showdown started last night (Wednesday) in New Hamburg, too late for press deadline, and will continue here Sunday. To date only the dates of the first two games have been agreed upon.

Raiders took Huntsville Merchants to the brink of elimination last Wednesday when they won their third straight, and Friday Ron Lane pushed them over the edge.

The 20-year centre whose middle name is "work", scored four goals and assisted on the other as Georgetown ended the series with a 5-3 win. Terry Leswick was the other half of the one-two punch that knocked Merchants into an early spring. He assisted on each of the Lane goals and was the only other scorer.

Phil Lavell was the only other Raider to pick up a point.

Wednesday, Fred Cowbrough frustrated Huntsville snipers when they outshot Raiders in the first period, grew more stubborn as the game progressed to blank Merchants 4-0 on their home ice.

A crowd of about 800 watched as Georgetown went well into the second period before breaking a scoreless deadlock. They built a 3-0 lead in the middle period and added the fourth late in the third.

Terry Hay took his turn in the limelight with a couple of goals and an assist. Paul Robinson and Ron Lane also scored.

To this point the Raider rec-

ord is amazing. In 22 games against Junior C competition they have won 42, tied 4 and lost just 6. Their playoff record is 2 defeats in 22 games.

Huntsville had a 1-0 lead before the first minute was up, but Raiders evened things two minutes later and captured the lead, for keeps near the end of the period.
