

TAKE NOTICE that the council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board pursuant to the provisions of Subsection 2 of Section 13 of The Municipal Act for approval of by-law 68-21 passed on the 25th day of March, 1968, to redivide the Town of Georgetown into three new wards. A copy of the by-law, a description of the boundaries of the proposed new wards and a plan showing the proposed new tards are available for inspection at the office of the Town Clerk during regular business hours.

Any person wishing to object to this application may within fourteen (14) days from the date of publication of this notice, file in writing with the Clerk of the Town of Georgetown at the address below-noted notice of his objection to approval of the said by-law.

. The Ontario Municipal Roard may approve of the said by law but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the by-law will be considered. Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection.

The last date for filing objections-will be the 26th day of April, 1968.
