Finally, the Board decided to plan for staggered hours in the fall, and draw up their schedules on that basis.

The popularity of the voluntary Oral French class at Centennial school prompted the Board to investigate the feasibility of offering Oral French to all Grade eights in the system, by September.

Centennial principal, Howard Allan reported enthusiastic reception by the pupils, who chose French over other activities such as juggling and choir. He asked if it could be made a regular part of the programme.

The Board felt it would be unfair to offer French only in the one school and asked the opinion of area superintendent O. W. McDowell.

He agreed it should be offered to all Grade eights on the same basis as art and music. He reassured the Board no one would be failed because of their standing in the Oral French. In reply to another question, he pointed out it was already being offered in Milton, Acton, Nassagawaga, Burlington, and Oakville.

The course under consideration leads to the new course to be offered in Grade 9.

Ed Wilson suggested the public school board should work with the high school in setting up the programme.

A meeting with principals will be held to discuss the cost of the proposal.

He repeated his previous statement that any change now would probably mean a route exclusively on the highway. He also claimed a by-law restricting the use of trucks and buses would be necessary.

"I see no alternative but the present route," he concluded.

Reeve W. Hunter claimed he had never seen any correspondence from the bus company asking the route be changed, and maintained it was Council's idea. Talks with the Gray Coach might be productive, he said.

"We didn't pass a by-law to change the route the first time, and I don't think we need one to change again." He was in favour of the route going back to Main Street.

Cr. Emmerman compared the sympathetic attitude taken by council when mud was being dropped on the road from builders' trucks, and the unsympathetic attitude when something more important — large buses — were put on a residential street.

Summing up the mayor stated, "We've got this far, the reeve and deputy reeve have taken it upon themselves to find out how Gray Coach feel about changing the route back again. I've taken a stand, and no matter how many people come here

will stick to it, but I will continue to respect someone else's stand," he concluded.

Cr. John Hole reminded council they had been 100% in favour of a change when it was first discussed, before it ever came to a vote.

"I'll agree to taking them off Charles Street, if you can come up with another route."

The mayor repeated the necessity of passing a by-law and having it approved by the Department of Highways. "If the reeve and Cr. Emmerman are sincere," he commented, "it would be simple to introduce a motion to prepare a by-law tonight." He went on to remark, "where everything is serene, a most unusual situation." He concluded by putting it square up to them to show their sincerity. He finished with "Talk is cheap."

"Yes, talk is cheap, and you should know," retorted the reeve, "I pay a lot more taxes than you do." He branded the by-law idea as "hog-wash" and advocated council talk to Gray Coach Lines.
