#### Mrs. Thomas J Fisher, 88, Lifelong District Resident

A lifelong district resident, Mrs. Thomas J. Fisher, 88, died in Halton Centennial Manor, Milton, on April 2.

The former Lillian Agnes Wilson, she was the daughter of John and Hannah Gastle Wilson and was born on their 9th Line farm. Following their marriage in 1909, Mr. and Mrs. Fisher farened on the 5th Line on the present Bruce McClure farm. Retiring in 1944, they moved to town and lived on Charles Street.

Refore her marriage Mrs. Fither was organist for twelve years at St., Stephen's Anglican Church, Hornby, and their marriage, took place there. She later attended Boston Presbyterian Church, and after moving to Georgelown was a member of Knox Presbyterian and the Park Circle of the church.

Mr. Fisher died in 1960. She leaves two children Reta Mrs. A. G. Hunter of Burlington . and Lloyd of R.R. 3, Georgetown; seven granddaughters and one great-francison. She was predeceased by nine brothers and sis-


