Seek Two Apartment Permits Council Defers Approval

A move by Cr. Roy Ballentine to have Aler Investments proposed two 44-suite apartment houses at the corner of Campbell Gate and Mountainview approved in principle by council Monday night, April 18th ran into stiff opposition and was withdrawn for a week.

The Planning Board had adopted in principle the plan but no building permit was to be issued until the final plans were approved by planning board and council.

Cr. Ballentine explained that the area is now C2 (commercial) but that business just didn't seem to be attracted there. He said he felt it is a good site for apartments, close to shopping, bus routes and a main road. He stated there were 1.5 parking spaces per unit and 35 per cent green belt.

"If council approves in principle," stated Cr. Ballentine, "the developer can go ahead with the architect plans and start negotiating on financing."

Cr. Ballentine concluded by asking council to decide if they want high density in this area. Deputy-Reeve Art Speight agreed it is an ideal location. But Cr. R. Francis reminded the council a zoning change is necessary, and asked how council could deal with it under the circumstances.

Cr. Ballentine said OMB approval would be sought. "But there's no point in spending our own money and the developer's unless council okays the idea of apartments in that area," he added.

The mayor pointed out that council has not been equally considerate of others. "I think we are a little hasty, it should be a formal application. Others went to this expense without knowing the result," said the mayor.

Reeve Hunter too suggested: "Everybody should be dealt with in the same way." Finally the motion was withdrawn for a week.

Kerr Committee Head For Ontario for Legal Bills

George Kerr, MPP for Halton West has been elected Chairman of the Legislature's Committee on Legal Bills and Municipal Affairs.

This Committee is required to study legal questions or bills proposing to amend general laws, as well as those which are concerned with the Dept. of Municipal Affairs.

All bills referred to this Committee must be reported back to the House for final action.

George Kerr was first elected to the Legislature in the 1963 general election and re-elected last October with a majority of more than 5,000 votes over his closest opponent. He served as Chairman of this Committee during the last Session.

Seeks Licence to Operate County Town Radio Station

A new radio station based in Milton and serving most of Halton County could be in operation by September, if an application before the Board of Broadcast Governors is successful at a hearing in Ottawa later this month.

Loren James Cassina of London who is making the application, said since Milton is the focal point of Halton County and as the county seat, with regional government on the horizon, he felt a radio station in Milton is "awful logical, in a lot of ways."

He and co-directors Ernest Hennessey, a Burlington lawyer and William Logan, a Burlington real estate broker, applied last March for a radio station licence for Burlington. They were turned down by the BBG because the only frequency available was a "daytime only" outlet and the Board frowns on such daytime stations in metro areas like Burlington-Hamilton.

Since then the directors have studied the Halton area and come to the conclusion Milton would be the best site, Mr. Cassina explained. From Milton their station could serve the town plus Burlington, Acton and Georgetown and the surrounding townships. "We have deliberately avoided attempts to steer a signal in the direction of Oakville," he said, due to an existing station there.

The BBG hearing is scheduled to be held in the Convention Hall on the ground floor of the Chateau Laurier in Ottawa on April 23. The hearing is open to the public but anyone wishing to oppose the application must file 20 copies of a brief in opposition, or a notice of intention to oppose the application, with the Secretary of

the Board. Mr. Cassina said an answer on the hearing should be available by May, and if it is successful construction would start immediately on a studio and transmitter site. "We have the property under option," the director reported. He refused to pinpoint the location.

Mr. Cassina is a co-founder of station CJOE which opened last year at London. He has since sold his shares to a partner and devoted his time to launching a station here in Halton County. He earlier spent some time as a newspaper reporter and advertising salesman in Peel County.

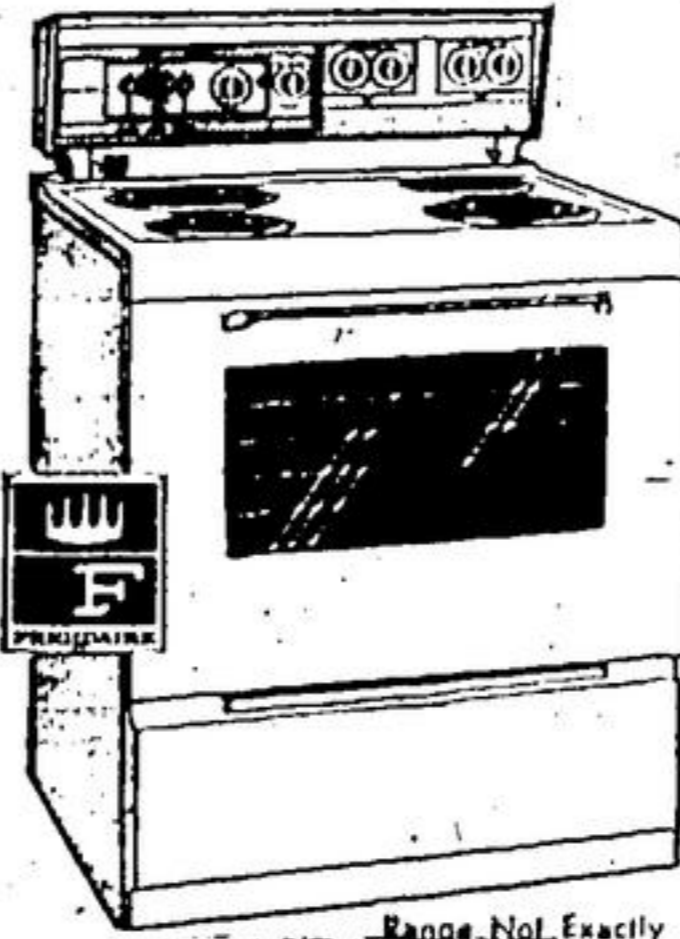

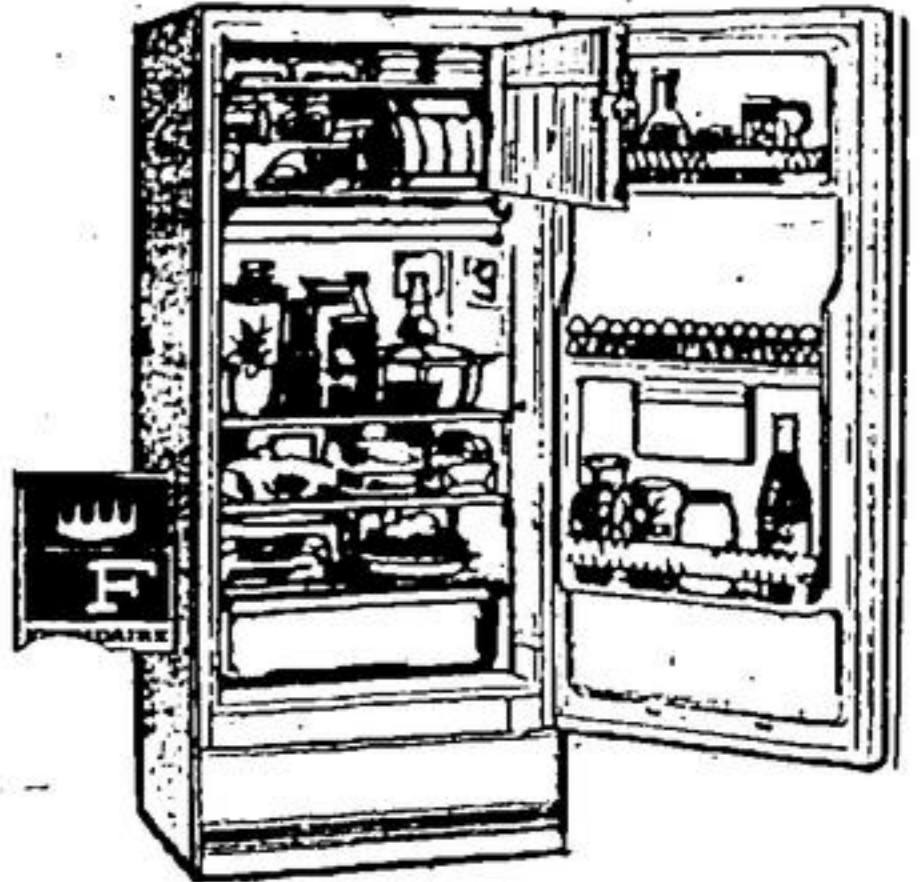
