Forty Years With Bible Class, Alcott Retiring

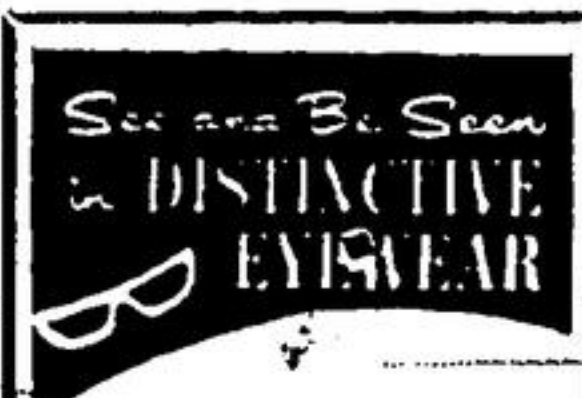
This Sunday will end forty years of service as a Bible class leader for Gordon Alcott, when he preaches the sermon in West- on Presbyterian Church.
