**Separate Notice for School Tax Under County Board**

Many aspects of the new County Boards of Education are still a mystery to municipal officials charged with the responsibility of effecting the change-over. Gradually, however, the complexities of the new system are being explained by the appropriate government department.

The financial aspects of the new system came under the scrutiny of the Association of Ontario counties at the recent convention in Toronto.

The following nine points on financing were contained in a report.

1. The local share of the cost of operating the public and secondary schools in a county will be divided among the municipalities comprising the school division in proportion to the provincial equalized assessments of the municipalities concerned.
2. The council of each municipality shall levy and collect its share of school costs and transfer it to the board from time to time as required but not later than December 15th.
3. The notice of taxes shall be given separately for school purposes or in a manner that will clearly indicate the taxes imposed for school purposes.
4. There will be no change in the manner in which taxes are collected at present or in the method of taking action for uncollected taxes.
5. The county board will issue its own debentures.
6. The clerk-treasurer of the county and of each municipality will notify the treasurer of the divisional board before February 1st, 1969, and before January 1st in succeeding years, of the amount of principal and interest due and payable in that year in respect of debentures issued for school purposes.
7. The treasurer of the divisional board will pay to the county or municipal treasurer the amount required for school debt charges before the due date of payment by the county or municipality.
8. The arbitration of the assets and liabilities of the former boards will take place in 1969 and the determinations of the arbitrators will be effective in the year 1970.
9. Each divisional board will appoint its own auditor, and the treasurer of the board is required to publish or distribute the auditor's report.

**Hyde Wins Appeal, Town Ordered OK Apartment**

The Ontario Municipal Board has allowed an appeal for a zoning change in Georgetown to permit the erection of an eight-unit apartment building, but has made it conditional on the municipality and developer reaching a mutually satisfactory development agreement.

**Discuss New Plan for Merging Health Units**

A new merger bid has been made to Halton county council from neighbouring Peel county over the suggested amalgamation of the two county health units.

Halton warden William Hunter of Georgetown told council last week he had talked to Peel warden Cyril Clarke last Wednesday and that Peel had had something different in mind to the original suggestion.

Warden Hunter said Peel council had set up a special merger committee under a new regional government plan and that it was thinking more in terms of obtaining the amalgamation under a private bill to the legislature.

He said another meeting between Halton and Peel was being arranged to discuss the move. So far a date has not been set for the talks.

The amalgamation bid was made about a year ago when it became apparent that the Ontario government preferred health unit operations on a regional basis rather than continuing on the present county level of jurisdiction.

If the Halton-Peel deal is settled, bigger grants would result from the province.

Amalgamation has often been discussed here because of staffing difficulties at both health units.
