

Estimate 1700 Eager Terra Cotta Fishermen

It is debatable whether fish outnumbered the anglers when the curtain went up in the 1968 trout season at midnight Friday.

Hundreds of fishermen from this area greeted the season by heading for their favourite streams, rivers and creeks in search of that fresh water salmon that gives such a good account of himself at the end of a sportsman's line.

Many anglers from here headed for the Terra Cotta Conservation Area's stocked ponds. Mr. Bentley of the CVCA told the Herald this week the Authority estimates roughly 1,764 people visited the Terra Cotta area Saturday and Sunday, most of them prepared to fish.

It's not known what degree of success they had since many failed to report their luck with the zatchoo man on the way out. He said it is important that the CVCA be aware of the number of fish being taken from their ponds because it lets them know when to stock again.

Racing on County Roads Gets Attention of OPP

During the week of April 21 to 27, 1968 inclusive, personnel of the North Halton Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police, worked a total of 908 1/2 hours and patrolled 9,830 miles on area highways. There were 71 traffic charges preferred, 74 traffic warnings issued, and 88 vehicles safety checked. There were 74 convictions registered in Magistrate's Court.

As a result of complaints from citizens regarding cars racing on County roads, strict action shall be taken against anyone found to be racing.

Section 91 of the Highway Traffic Act states:—

There were 7 property damage accidents investigated and 2 personal injury accidents resulting in 3 persons being injured. Property damage totalled \$4,440. Causes of accidents were inattentive driving; cutting in; did not have right of way; and following too closely. 5 charges were preferred as a result of these accidents.

There were 41 general occurrences reported, including 3 minor thefts being investigated, 1 premise found insecure, at night, 2 persons charged for violation of the Liquor Control Act, and 1 missing juvenile located by Metro Toronto Police Department.

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Add Mid-Morning Train To City CNR Service

A new mid-morning passenger train run to Toronto was introduced this week by Canadian National Railway. Commencing Sunday the new east-bound train runs to Toronto every week day morning leaving Georgetown at 10:10 a.m. and reaching Toronto about 50 minutes later.

This and other times given are in Daylight Saving Time.

The early morning train which originates in Guelph will leave Georgetown for Toronto at 7:02 a.m. arriving in Toronto at 8 o'clock. The next train, from Stratford, arrives in Georgetown at 8:22 a.m. Then the other services to Toronto via Georgetown arrive here at 10:19 a.m., 3 p.m. and 10:07 p.m.

The afternoon train that leaves Toronto at 4:25 p.m. arrives in Georgetown at 5:16 p.m.

Passengers travelling home to Georgetown in the evenings have a choice of four trains leaving Toronto at 5:20 p.m., 6:10 p.m. and 11:05 p.m. They leave Georgetown for Guelph, Owen Sound, Sarnia and Stratford, respectively.

Eastbound passengers leaving for Montreal can be provided with through sleeping accommodation on the evening train leaving Georgetown at 10:07 p.m.
