Fire Guts Car, Driver Is Treated for Shock

Mrs. Mary E. Stableford, of Cresswell, Ontario was taken to Peel Memorial Hospital suffering shock the result of a sudden fire in her car Friday.

The fire occurred on Highway 7 near the 3rd Line East Chinguacousy, about four miles east of Norval. A Chinguacousy fire department spokesman said it was probably touched off by a cigarette butt. The interior of the car was completely gutted, and some personal belongings were badly burned.

Halton Gets Two Federal Members After June Election

The federal election of June 25 will be the first ever held in which the county is split into two ridings.

The split is part of a nationwide redistribution of electoral boundaries — which was made in 1968. An independent commission of non-politicians decided on the new boundaries.

Formerly, a parliamentary committee had decided on electoral boundaries.

City Dwellers
The changes will give city dwellers a stronger voice in the new parliament — and will decrease the importance of rural voters.

Previous to the 1966 redistribution, the last change of electoral boundaries had taken place in 1962 — and was based on the 1961 census.

Six general elections — the longest string ever without redistribution — took place before the one for June was announced. Many observers felt the changes were long overdue.

However, the change will not be a painless one — as the merging of some ridings may leave members of the same party competing in the same new riding for a nomination this year.

In the new parliament there will be 284 ridings, and the same number of members. In the parliament just dissolved there were 263 constituencies and 265 members — as there were two double ridings which elect two MPs.

Both of these double ridings were in the Maritimes.

Two Members
In Halton, there should be no friction in the changeover. The former riding has been split in half, so rather than having more than one MP trying for re-election in the area, there is now room for two MPs in Halton.

For the federal election the county is split down the middle. The east part of the county will retain the name of Halton — and will consist of the town of Oakville; the town of Milton; the township of Esquewaugh; and the township of Erin (in Wellington County), directly north of Esquewaugh.)

The western part of the county will form part of the riding of Halton — Westworth — consisting of the town of Burlington; the township of Nasagaweya and the part of Westworth County included in East and West Flamborough townships and a small part of Burlington in Westworth County.

Provincial Election
The riding divisions are different than those established for the provincial elections.

Last fall, for the first time, Halton was divided into Halton East and West for the provincial election. Before that, the entire county had comprised the riding of Halton.

Now, Halton East includes the towns of Oakville and Milton and most of the township of Esquewaugh. Halton West is formed of Burlington and Nasagaweya township, and a strip running across the top of Esquewaugh, including Acton and Georgetown.

At the present, Jim Snow, (PC) represents Halton East at Queen's Park in Toronto, and George Kerr, also a PC, and the former Halton member, represents Halton West.

Dr. Harry Harley, Liberal, who lives in Oakville has represented the riding of Halton in Ottawa since first being elected in April, 1963.

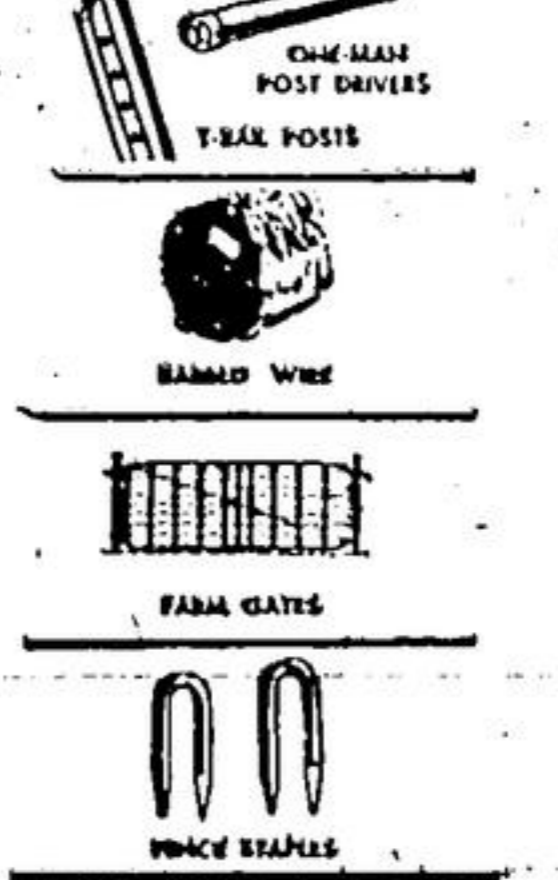

Kilbride School Girl Missing for a Year

At 4:05 p.m., April 27, four persons watched 10 year-old Marianne Schuett, a Grade 4 pupil at Kilbride public school in North Halton County, getting into a car.

It was the last time she was ever seen.

More than 18,000 people looked for her, but all that was found was a laceless blue running shoe more than 10 miles away.

Mrs. Milton Schuett said her daughter was wearing the same shoe when she left for school in the community which is north of Burlington.

Today, despite rewards totaling more than \$5,500, the trail is cold.

In the Burlington detective office a picture of Marianne is turning yellow.

Police have a sketch of the man they think is Marianne's abductor — a thin-faced, elderly man who wears glasses and a fedora.

Police say there is little hope that Marianne will be found alive. They said it is unlikely that her body will be found.

"I don't think we are much further ahead than we were last year in mid-May."

The massive search of North Halton countryside for Marianne was called off after 10 days. Since then, investigations have stretched from Halifax to Vancouver. More than 700 suspects have been investigated.
