feated Tory MP Sandy Best to gain the federal seat.

This decision was one of a number of factors which led to his re-election in 1963.

That year he won by a margin of 9,522 votes and almost equalled that number again in 1965 when he beat Allan Mason by a total of 8,803 votes.

Dr. Harley has served as chairman of two major parliamentary committees and won nationwide attention for his work. His first committee work involved heading studies into drug safety in Canada.

As chairman of the Commons committee studying the cost of drugs he spearheaded a campaign which resulted in legislation removing the 11 per cent "tax on sickness" which the federal government had previously imposed on all pharmaceutical prescriptions.

In addition he headed a committee which studied abortion and birth control legislation. The committee brought down its findings early this year.

Among the list of recommendations was one which said abortion should be allowed where the health or life of the mother is seriously endangered by pregnancy.

In June of last year Dr. Harley was re-elected vice-chairman of the Commons standing committee on Veterans' Affairs.

Major Reforms
As minister of justice - a portfolio which he has retained as Prime Minister - Pierre Elliott Trudeau introduced an "omnibus" bill to amend the criminal code near the end of the latest session of parliament.

Included in this bill is a clause based largely on the suggestions of Dr. Harley's committee studying abortion. The bill will have to wait, however, until after the election is over and parliament reconvenes.

Asked Sunday what he felt was the high point of his parliamentary career Dr. Harley was quick to reply.

"Being chairman of the drugs committee and to actually have government legislation based on our recommendations" he said.

"It's nice to know somebody was paying attention to what we did" he added.

At 3 Day Assembly
