Despite service rendered in Georgetown, town council on Monday declined to make a grant to the Brampton-based Victorian Order of Nurses.

A request was received by letter, pointing out that the V.O.N. depends heavily on public and municipal donations. Two hundred calls had been made locally in a half year, the letter said.

Mayor Gibbons explained that a town has no authority for such grants, and that these are made at the county level. Deputy Reeve Speight said that the V.O.N. is not on the Halton grants list, as far as he knows.

## Ballinfad Farmer was Member of Town Band

A farmer at Ballinfad and Hornby, William Near, 91, died at the Wellesley Hospital, Toronto, April 20. He was a resident of 208 Heath Street W., Toronto.

Son of Frederick Smith Near and Christianna Henderson, he was born on the 10th Line and attended the 10th Line Public School and Georgetown High School. Ancestors on both sides of the family were U. E. Loyalists.

Following his marriage in 1905 to Edie Townsend, they farmed at Ballinfad and later on the 1st Line, Esquimaux.

Mr. Near was a member of the Georgetown band and played in it for some years at the turn of the century. He was a member of Timothy Eaton Memorial Church in Toronto.

Predeceased by his wife in 1961 and a daughter Kathleen in 1967, he leaves seven children, Fred of Streetsville, Clarence and Mrs. Ellis Barrman (Ruth) of Toronto, Mrs. Giles Wilson (Aileen) of Milton, Mrs. William Carhart (Margaret) of Stouartown, Lloyd of Oakville and Mrs. Kenneth Fearley (Myrtle) of London; a sister, Mrs. James Reid, Saskatoon, Sask.; 17 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.
